



HISTORY

of

FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH Waynesboro, Virginia


In reviewing the history of the early Presbyterian Churches in Virginia, we find the First Presbyterian Church of Waynesboro has existed as a separate and distinct organization for one hundred years, although it has in connection with Tinkling Spring a history reaching further into the past. In 1798 much of the land on which the town of Waynesboro now stands, was owned by Samuel and Jean Estill, who laid the same off into lots and sold them. The beautiful eminence

on the west overlooking the site of the embryo village, was owned by James Flack, who donated a plot of ground as a site for a church and a cemetery. An humble frame building was erected on the brow of the hill, to be used as a union church which stood until 1824 when it gave place to a comfortable brick structure, built for the accommodation of that part of Tinkling Spring congregation within the bounds of Waynesboro and vicinity. After the erection of this building in 1824, the church previously known as "Tinkling Spring" was called "Tinkling Spring and Waynesboro." The church was served by one pastor who ministered at both places.

The first supply of the Tinkling Spring and Waynesboro church was the Rev. James C. Wilson, whose death occurred in 1839. He was succeeded by the Rev. B. M. Smith who was the first to have a formal installation as pastor.

Dr. Smith, when a lad, lived in the home of Dr. John Holt Rice, founder of Union Theological Seminary, Richmond, Va.

In 1845 Mr. Smith was called to Staunton. On his resignation the relationship existing between Tinkling Spring and Waynesboro closed. In this connection it may be interesting to state that Mr. Wilson and Mr. Smith, while ministering to the church of Tinkling Spring and Waynesboro, resided in the village. Mr. Wilson owned a home which burned a year or two after his death. On this ground was afterwards erected, by William B. Alexander, a dwelling and workshop.

FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH ORGANIZED

In 1846 a move was made to organize a church at Waynesboro for the convenience of the village. Lexington Presbytery granted permission and the following 49 members were transferred to Waynesboro and the church was organized May 9, 1846.

The infant church elected and ordained the following elders from the mother church: Messrs. Daniel Fishburne, James Brooks, Charles Patrick, W. W. King, John Wayt. Later Mr. William Withrow was added to the number and was appointed by the Session to serve as Stated Clerk.

At the same time the following men were elected deacons: John G. Guthrie, Dr. Livingston Waddell, Samuel H. Bell, and William Withrow, Jr. All officers were ordained and installed on May 9, 1846. William Withrow, Jr., served as clerk of the Session for seven years while a member of the Diaconate.

The little brick church on the hill, with the cemetery to the north, a hitching yard to the rear for the benefit of the country members, was for years the only church in this community.

EARLY CHURCH CUSTOMS

It may be interesting to mention some queer customs of our church in early days, as related by one who was a member of the little church on the hill. At the communion season a very narrow table was placed across the church in front of the pulpit, the members came from their seats and sat at this table remembering our Lord's command "This do in remembrance of me." Presumably this manner of conducting the Lord's Supper was brought from Scotland by our forefathers.

Another custom was that the men sat on one side of the edifice and the women on the other side. There was no vestibule so that when a young lady had an escort they separated at the door as it would have been too conspicuous for them

to sit together.

THE SUCCESSION OF PASTORS

The First Presbyterian Church has been blessed with a continued succession of able and

spiritual men as pastors.

Rev. William T. Richardson, the first beloved pastor, was a native of Charlotte County, Virginia. He was a student of Hampden-Sydney College under celebrated teachers and was in the graduating class of which Dr. Moses Hoge was a member. Following his graduation from Union Theological Seminary, a licentiate of West Hanover Presbytery, he entered upon a long and fruitful pastorate of 23 years, building a solid foundation for the young church at Waynesboro. At the time

of his death he was the able editor of The Central Presbyterian now The Presbyterian Outlook.

Rev. S. J. Baird, D.D., was pastor from 1870 to 1873. His life work may be summed up as author, educator and Christian minister. During his pastorate new officers were elected for the Sabbath School and the second Board of Deacons was elected, composed of Philip Smith, T. H. Antrim, Charles Brooks, C. R. Haines and J. A. Patterson.

After the resignation of Dr. Baird, Rev. Frank McCutchan was secured to supply the vacant church. So well were his labors appreciated that he was called to the pastorate and installed May 23, 1874. He served the church for nearly twelve years and his work was greatly blessed.

In the spring of 1885 the Waynesboro church was again vacant, so the Rev. A. R. Cocke, D.D., at that time in Lexington, Virginia, was invited to occupy the pulpit until permanent arrangements could be made. The fourth Sunday in September, 1885, Dr. Cocke preached his first sermon. On October 11, 1885, a call was extended to him which he accepted and his installation took place April 3rd, 1886. Under the wise leadership of the pastor the membership increased to more than 400. In addition to his pastoral work he was professor of philosophy in the Valley Seminary. He served as chaplain at the University of Virginia one year, 1895-1896. During his absence Rev. C. W. Trawick served the church very acceptably.

Dr. Cocke was the author of "No Immersion in the Bible," "Am I Free," etc. The works which gave him the greatest reputation as a Biblical scholar was "Studies in Ephesians" and "Studies in the Epistles of John." His life proved of immeasurable good not only to his beloved church but to the people of the town at large. When he passed to his Heavenly reward, August 23, 1901, a gloom was cast over the entire community.

Rev. Charles R. Stribling, D.D., was pastor of the First Church from January, 1902, to July, 1910. Dr. Stribling was a preacher of ability and the church was strengthened by his ministry.

Rev. D. K. Walthall, D. D., was installed December 18, 1910, serving well and faithfully until August 1, 1925. His labors were marked by unusual growth to the church. The membership increased from 420 to 830.

Rev. R. W. Cousar, D. D., was installed August 14, 1926. The work of the church progressed under his ministry. He won the deep and abiding love of his people and left many friends in this community when he accepted a call to Central Presbyterian Church, Chattanooga, Tennessee, in April, 1939.

In August, 1939, Rev. James G. Patton, Jr., D.D., became pastor. Dr. Patton is a minister of zeal and ability. After four years pastorate he resigned to become Executive Secretary of the General Assembly's Committee on Stewardship.

Rev. C. Newman Faulconer, the present pastor, began his ministry here March 19, 1944, preaching his first sermon from the text Galatians 6:14. The work of the church is progressing under his leadership. Last year 159 members were added to the church. The present membership is 974.

MAIN STREET CHURCH BUILDING

The church on Main Street was erected during Mr. McCutchan's ministry. The old church on cemetery hill was torn down and the material used as far as possible in the new building. In four years the church was completed and dedicated on April 28, 1878.

Dr. B. M. Smith of Union Theological Seminary preached the dedicatory sermon. Other ministers taking part in the exercises were Rev. W. T. Richardson, D.D., former pastor, Rev. N. H. Graybill of the Methodist Church and the pastor, Rev. Frank McCutchan. The cost of the lot, church furniture, etc. amounted to about \$7,208.00. The building is of brick. The interior was quite attractive. The pulpit furniture, of walnut, was donated by Mrs. Hugh L. Gallaher, Sr., a member of the church. The pews were of ash with walnut scrolls. The chandelier and the massive outer door of walnut and the stained glass windows were purchased by the ladies. The seating capacity was over 300, and no doubt it was the most commodious structure in the town at that time. The building at the present time is owned and occupied by the Waynesboro Publishing Corporation.

EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

There were founded in the town at about 1878 two institutions which have proven great blessings to the community. These were the Valley Female Seminary and the Fishburne Military School. Of the former of these, Mr. McCutchan may be said to have been the moving spirit in its organization. An elder of the church, Mr. James A. Fishburne, founded the latter which carries on a successful work at the present time.

THE GOLDEN JUBILEE

The fiftieth anniversary of the formation of this church was celebrated May 9 and 10, 1896. This was the Golden Jubilee. The anniversary sermon was preached by the Rev. A. M. Fraser, D.D., of Staunton from the text Psalm 25:10. A fine climax to this interesting occasion was an address on "Presbyterianism, Its History and Principles" by Col. Bennett H. Young of Louisville, Kentucky.

MISSIONARY SOCIETY ORGANIZED

The first Missionary Society was organized January 4, 1883 and called The Evelyn Houston Missionary Society, in honor of one who went out from this church and died a missionary in a foreign land. This society was organized with 37 members and the following officers, namely: Mrs. C. R. Haines, president, Mrs. W. M. Caldwell, vice-president, Miss Annie Fishburne, treasurer,

Miss Annie Caldwell, secretary. Mrs. Haines soon resigned and Mrs. E. G. Fishburne succeeded her for a short time. In March, 1884, Miss Lou Withrow was elected president, Mrs. J. A. Patterson, vice-president, Mrs. C. R. Haines, secretary, Miss Annie Fishburne and Mrs. J. F. Templeton were treasurers at different times, but Miss Lou Withrow held the office of president and Mrs. Haines of secretary for 35 consecutive years.




Wayne Avenue Church. Erected 1911.

THE PRESENT CHURCH BUILDING

The present church building was completed in 1911. Plans were drawn up and presented to the congregation by Mr. R. G. Vance, an honored elder, and the cornerstone laid in August, 1910. The church was dedicated November 12, 1911. Rev. W. W. Moore, D.D., president of Union Theological Seminary, preached the dedicatory sermon, and two former pastors took part in the exercises of that day. The structure is a handsome and commodious building with a seating capacity of over 800. In 1938 the church auditorium was redecorated, the interior repainted, Venetian blinds replaced the old shades, the choir loft extended and a new carpet laid. Mrs. Ernest Mosby donated three walnut chairs for use on the pulpit platform. In 1939 a new pulpit Bible was presented by Miss Louise Quarles.

NEW YOUTH BUILDING

On April 21, 1940, The Board of Deacons, under the leadership of Dr. Patton, presented a report to the congregation relative to the need of an addition to the church's religious education facilities. The report was approved by the congregation and steps were taken to plan financing and construction of a Youth Building. Mr. R. G. Vance was appointed chairman of the planning committee. The financial plan as suggested by Dr. Patton was that every member of the church and church school should pray for, work for and sacrificially give to this enterprise. The building was completed and paid for in a period


of about four years. The new structure is of brick, three stories high. Rooms are provided for Sunday School classes, also Boy and Girl Scout Troops sponsored by the church. The Social Hall provides for religious pageants and meetings of the young people in a Christian atmosphere. The value of the church plant as it stands at the present time is around \$150,000.00.

MANSES

In 1883 this church built its first manse. In 1890 a new home for the pastor was erected near the present church on Wayne Avenue. This manse was later remodeled, and in 1926 it was sold and moved from the church lot. A lot was purchased on Maple Avenue and a beautiful new modern home was completed in July, 1927.

SMYRNA CHAPEL


Many years ago Mrs. Mollie Fauber was zealous in trying to secure contributions for a Sunday school building near Dooms Station. Finally in 1889 a neat chapel was built on a site given by Mr. John Fauber. For years Mr. W. H. McCormick, an elder of the First Church was the superintendent of the Sunday School.

The work at Smyrna during the organizational period was under the supervision of Rev. W. C. Buchanan, who later became a missionary to Japan, where he served for forty years.

In 1937 Smyrna Chapel was placed under the supervision of the Second Presbyterian Church of Waynesboro, and pending plans for the erection of a larger edifice to be located more conveniently for the people of the community were pushed forward. An attractively styled rockveneered building, having a seating capacity of about 125, together with additional rooms in the rear, was completed in 1938, in the village of Dooms.

ANTIOCH CHAPEL

In 1890 a neat chapel was built on land donoted by Mr. George C. Maslin. Sunday School, and Sunday afternoon preaching was held at Antioch for many years. The succeess of this appointment, however, was limited and later it was discontinued. (See picture on next page.)

BASIC CITY CHURCH ORGANIZED

In December, 1890, a church was organized at Basic with 19 members, most of whom were given certificates by the First Church. A church edifice was built costing about \$4500.00 of which amount \$2000.00 was furnished by the mother church. Owing to the financial depression after the boom this church had quite a struggle to exist. April 1, 1924, by order of Lexington Presbytery, this church was united with the First Church, but on May 8, 1927, the church was reorganized.

The old church was sold in 1938 and an attractive modern building erected on Delphine Avenue. It is now called The Second Presbyterian Church, is self-supporting and has been for some years under the pastorate of Rev. H. E. Truitt.

GLEN KIRK CHAPEL

It was about fifty years ago that Rev. A. R. Cocke, D.D., then pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, conceived the idea of establishing a Mission in the neighborhood of Calf Mountain.

Beginning with services under the trees, a rock for a pulpit, and boards for benches, W. H. McCormick, R. N. Gaw, and Mr. and Mrs. Bunn, with Miss Lottie Fauber joined Dr. Cocke in this pioneer work. In a very short time the foundation for the present building was laid with Dr. Cocke assisting in the work himself. The erection of the church was completed in 1897. Continuing in work well begun, many others of this church have given of their services to this mission.

Among them James A. Fishburne, whose Shetland ponies enabled more than one to reach the mission who might otherwise have been unable to do so with the condition of the roads at that time. Dr. and Mts. L. Nelson Bell, and Rev. J. Edwin Wayland, all of whom later served as missionaries to China, taught at Glen Kirk.

In selecting a name for this mission Mrs. Cocke suggested "Glen Kirk", and this name was adopted.


Miss Nettie Caldwell, a woman of great spiritual gifts, as well as many others, have given freely of their gifts and talents in support of this mission.

Mr. W. D. Quesenbery has been for 15 years the faithful superintendent.

This mission contributes annually to Home and Foreign Missions, Religious Education, and the Presbyterian Orphan's Home at Lynchburg, Va.

ORCHARD HILL CHAPEL


The opening service of the new chapel at Maupintown (Orchard Hill) on Sunday, April 26th, 1931, was a happy occasion for all present. The Rev. R. W. Cousar was in charge, and led in a brief devotional service. An appropriate prayer was made by Dr. H. C. MacPherson, and a beautiful solo was sung by Mrs. Guy Branaman.

The deed to the property was presented from the Park Realty Company to the trustees of the First Presbyterian Church and accepted by C. S. Gaw.

The name of the mission was announced as the Anne Carr Mission in honor of the mothers of Mrs. T. W. Quesenbery and Mrs. F. P. Loth, who were two of the prime movers and contributors to the project. The pews were the gift of Mrs. John Robson. Mr. H. S. Meeteer is superintendent of the Sunday-school at this chapel.

NORTH AVENUE CHAPEL

Through the untiring efforts of Mrs. T. W. Quesenbery a mission was organized at North Avenue in 1934. Mr. O. D. Fitzgerald is the present superintendent of the Sunday-school.

The forward-looking program of the Home Mission Committee of Lexington Presbytery, and the benefits accruing from the missionary activities of the First Presbyterian Church, are well depicted in the two pictures of the original Smyrna Chapel, built in 1889, and the new Smyrna Chapel, built in 1938. The original chapel was deemed too far removed from the people living in the fast-developing settlement at Dooms, and had been proven too small for expansive growth. Plans were laid for a site within the set-

tlement of Dooms, and the movement had appealed to the Home Mission Committee of the Presbytery sufficiently for it to guarantee the purchase of this site, when it was determined advisable to place the Smyrna work under the supervision of the Second Presbyterian Church of Waynesboro. Under the combined work of Rev. H. E. Truitt, and W. J. Buchanan, an elder of the First Presbyterian Church, who was the Superintendent of the Smyrna Sunday-school, cooperating with the Home Mission Committee of Lexington Presbytery, the new building was erected, the grounds were graded and sown in grass, classes re-organized, with a record attendance of 102.

CARILLONIC BELLS

On Sunday, December 9, 1945, impressive dedicatory services were held for the carillonic bells, gift to the First Church from Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Mathis in memory of their son, William Howard Mathis, Jr., killed in World War II. (It is regretted that it is impossible to picture this much appreciated gift.)

As a memorial to their beloved son, Dicky, Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Clemmer landscaped the court lving between the original Church edifice and the Youth Building, decorating it with beautiful boxwoods and Canadian spruces and a walk-way of stone. This plot will be marked with an attractive copper tablet indicating its memorial, and dedicating the plot to the Youth of our Church. Dicky was born December 24th, 1924 and died March 27th, 1939.

MEETING OF LEXINGTON PRESBYTERY IN YEAR 1896

On the next page of this book there is reproduced a picture of the members of Lexington Presbytery which met in regular session during the Golden Jubilee Celebration, the fiftieth anniversary, of the founding of the First Presbyterian Church of Waynesboro, Va., on May 10th, 1896. The background of this picture is the eastwall of the Main Street Church building. The familiar faces to be seen in this picture are Dr. A. R. Cocke, Pastor; Rev. Bailey, who served as pulpit supply for a season; Rev. Wm. C. White, Stated Clerk of Lexington Presbytery; Rev. A. M. Fraser. Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Staunton, Va.; Mr. James A. Fishburne and Mr. I. Frank Templeton, officers in the First Presbyterian Church of Waynesboro; as well as other prominent ministers and laymen of the Presbytery.

EVANGELISTIC ACTIVITIES

The First Church has had seasons of spiritual refreshing at various periods of its history. Reference may be made to the visits of Dr. William Dinwiddie, Dr. Drew, Dr. E. O. Guerant, Dr. Cummings, Rev. C. M. Howard, Mr. Fife and others. At a later period the Rev. Gypsy Smith, Jr., Rev. Trig A. Thomas, D.D., Rev. J. E. Thacker, D.D., Rev. J. S. Lyons, Jr., and more recently Dr. Walter L. Lingle and Dr. J. Blanton Belk.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

The Woman's Auxiliary was organized December 22, 1919, at a joint meeting of the three societies, namely: Evelyn Houston Missionary Society, the Alonzo Rice Cocke Society and Ladies Aid Society. The real work of the circles did not begin until April, 1920. Mrs. Walthall, wife of our pastor at that time, was of great assistance in organizing the Auxiliary Circle Plan in our church. God has wonderfully blessed the work and this is now one of the largest Auxiliaries in Lexington Presbytery.

YOUNG PEOPLE OF THE CHURCH

The Christian Endeavor Society was a power for good among the young people for many years. At the present time there are two separate groups, the Senior Young People and the Pioneers.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Sunday School was organized about 1825. The names of Cesario Bias, Dr. Abraham Wayland, Robert Guy, John Wayt, Dr. Richard Henry, Daniel Fishburne, William Withrow, George A. Bruce and Dr. J. B. Winston are mentioned in connection with the early history of the school. At the present time the Sunday School has an enrollment of 674.

The church has been served efficiently by three Directors of Religious Education, namely: Miss Mary Garland Taylor, Miss Louise Crane and Miss Emily Kemp, (now Mrs. L. O. Barksdale). A Daily Vacation Bible School has been held every year since June 1927. Because of their association with the Sunday school and church it may be stated here that Mr. William Withrow and his beloved daughter, Miss Lou Withrow, have made the most unique characters in the history of this church. Mr. Withrow was for three-quarters of a century pupil, teacher and superintendent of the Sunday School. He was Clerk of the Session for 46 years and the record was so well kept that in all its pages there was not a single blot nor erroneous entry. Miss Lou Withrow was for 64 years a teacher and superintendent of the Primary Department. Her memory will ever be cherished in this community.

FOREIGN AND HOME MISSIONS

This church has been blessed with the missionary spirit ever since its organization. Miss Mary Robinson, a teacher in the Sunday School decades ago, went as a missionary to the island of Ceylon. The following missionaries were members of this church: Rev. M. H. Houston and wife. missionaries to China, Dr. R. B. Fishburne, medical missionary to China, Mrs. W. C. Buchanan, to Japan, Rev. W. H. Sheppard (colored) missionary to Africa; Mrs. C. B. Morton, to Brazil. Miss Helena Koiner, a member of this church, was for several years a teacher in the government schools in Nanking, China. This church has had an interest in the support of a number of missionaries. Three of whom were members of this church, namely: Rev. J. E. Wayland, China: Dr.

and Mrs. L. Nelson Bell, China. Other missionaries supported by the church were Dr. and Mrs. Donald W. Richardson, China; Mr. and Mrs. DeLand, Africa; Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Worth, Africa; Rev. and Mrs. W. A. McIlwaine, Japan. At the present time Rev. and Mrs. Sydenstricker in Brazil. Miss Nell Wilson, a member of this church, was for a while engaged in Home Mission work at Hampden, West Virginia. Mrs. Lyda C. Wood, who will be remembered as Miss Lyda Coiner, has for some years been engaged in mission work in the west.

It is of interest to note that at one time the Secretaries of Foreign and Home Missions of the Southern Presbyterian Church were members of this church. Reference is made to Dr. M. H. Houston, who was secretary of Foreign Missions and Dr. J. M. Craig, who was for many years secretary of Home Missions.

REV. WM. H. SHEPPARD, D.D.

Mention of several faithful colored members of the church: William Sheppard, first sexton and his wife, "Aunt Fannie" as she was affectionately called by her white friends and who was the mother of Rev. William H. Sheppard, honored missionary to Africa. When William was a small boy, Mrs. George A. Bruce, spoke to him on the street and asked him if he ever thought of being a Christian, and told him that she was praying for him to be a minister of the Gospel. The good seed sown in the heart of that colored boy

brought forth fruit and was the means of sending the Gospel to the dark continent of Africa. At a later period Obediah (Uncle Obe) Piper was for many years the faithful sexton.

REV. WM. H. SHEPPARD, D. D., AEMORIAL SERVICE

On Sunday evening, December 11th, 1927, the congregation of the First Presbyterian Church, Waynesboro, Va., gathered with about forty of their colored brethren to engage in a memorial service for the late Rev. Wm. H. Sheppard, D.D. The reason for this service being held was that Waynesboro is Sheppard's birthplace.

The object of the service as stated by the pastor, Rev. R. W. Cousar was "That God might be glorified as we honor one of His humble, but devoted, servants, who carried on so nobly and valiantly as a soldier of the cross. It is also hoped that through this service a new impression for missions will be made from a different angle, and that our hearts will be warmed to a deeper love for the Master."

After special music by the choir and prayer by Rev. J. Edwin Wayland, the first speaker introduced was Rev. John Calvin Scarborough, D.D., a colored minister. He was a personal friend of Sheppard and his best man at his wedding in Jacksonville, Fla.

Dr. Scarborough praised the life and work of Sheppard and referred to several pleasant occasions when he had entertained him in his home.

The main speaker of the occasion was Rev. R. A. Lapsley, D. D., of Richmond, Va., who dwelt upon the beautiful relation which existed between Sheppard and his brother, Samuel. The work of each would have been impossible without the other. Dr. Lapsley said he was glad to take part in such a service, for he hoped in some small way to repay Sheppard for the kindness shown his brother. He paid glowing tribute to his outstanding ability as a Christian worker, as an orator of the first rank, and to his sincere consecration. One quality, or grace, which the speaker emphasized was the deep humility of the man.

For this trait of character he was greatly beloved by the white race, and today it honors his memory for that fact. He was not only humble of character, but sacrificial in spirit. He had one ambition and that was to be of service in the neediest places in the world and thereby please his heavenly Father.

His promise of usefulness in this country was large before he went to Africa and, although pastor of a colored church in Atlanta, Ga., he forsook this place of honor, dedicating his life to the evangelization of his colored brethren in Africa. He spent twenty of the best years of his life, from 1890 to 1910, in this glorious work. At this time he returned to take up work in

Louisville, Ky., where he labored until the Lord called him home.

Dr. Lapsley closed by relating the touching scene that took place in New York City in 1890, when Mrs. Lapsley said to Sheppard as they were standing on the pier ready to board the ship, "Sheppard, take care of Sam." He then read an extract from a letter written by Sheppard to Mrs. Lapsley soon after the death of her son, in which he expressed the thought that he had lost his best friend, and that he had been true to his trust. Now, said Dr. Lapsley, I like to think that the same trio is together in that other land rejoicing together, where they shall never be separated again.

PERMANENT SESSIONAL COMMITTEES

Committee On Congregational Oversight

The purpose of this committee is to assist the pastor in keeping in contact with and ministering to members of our church—by seeing that each church family is visited periodically, especially in times of sickness, sorrow or trouble. It will help stimulate interest, participation and loyalty on the part of members. So far as possible this committee will also keep in touch with non-resident members. It will recommend transfers, retirements, etc.

Committee On Special Offerings And Cooperation With Diaconate

This committee will study all matters and consider requests pertaining to Special Offerings in our church and recommend to the Session and Diaconate any action deemed wise. This committee will work in cooperation with the Finance Committee of the Diaconate.

This committee will promote cooperation between the Session and Diaconate, by occasionally attending meetings of the Board of Deacons, reviewing their minutes and records, reporting items of interest, etc.

Committee On Evangelism And Religious Education

This committee has the twofold purpose of the ENLISTMENT AND ASSIMILATION of new

members, by keeping alive through every possible means the spirit of evangelism and by promoting an aggressive and continuous program of evangelism in our church.

Committee On Worship

This committee shall supervise all matters pertaining to Worship such as making necessary preparations for Communion services, supplying the pulpit and conducting mid-week services in absence of the pastor, considering requests or suggestions for changes in order of worship, etc., and by promoting a spirit of reverence and worship in every possible way in our church.

Defense Service Committee

This committee shall promote plans for maintaining contact between the church and men and women serving in the armed forces and for ministering to their needs and to their families in every way possible. Such ministry is to be extended to members of our own church and also to service men and women from other cities when they are in this area. This committee will consider not only present needs, but also post-war problems as well.

CENTENNIAL PAGEANT "A GARDEN OF MEMORIES"
