October the 23rd—1700

The Synod of Virginia met at New Providence church
agreeably to a resolve of the late Synod of Philadelphia
& New York when met at Philadelphia on the 21st
of May 1700 & was opened with a sermon from
Col. IV. 17 by the Rev'd John Brown the senior Mem-
ber present who Presided until another Moderator
was chosen

ber of Charges were exhibited against H^r W^t Barr

had met at Pittsburgh and heard the evidences
produced by both parties and from the
best light that could be obtained they pro-
ceeded to dismiss the Revd W^t Barr from his pasto-
ral relation to that people and to suspend him
from the exercise of his office until the judg-
ment of Synod could be known and agreed to
refer the case as stated before them to the Synod
with which W^t Barr concurred as appears from

in the discussion came to the following resolution
viz. The Synod having attended to the reference from
the Presbytery of the Stone in the case of the Revd Dr.
Barr & having considered a number of papers which
Mr Barr produced in order to show that he was ag-
grieved by the nature of the proceedings against
him before the Presbytery and by the sentence of
suspension pronounced against him by the
said Presbytery - Are of opinion that they

cannot proceed to form any decisive judgment⁴
in the case for the following reasons
Because the papers introduced by Mr Barr appear
to exhibit new matter which ought to be considered
before any final decision can be properly made.
Because they refer to Witnesses who were not called
upon in his trial before the Presbytery
Because they contain something which appears
contradictory in the conduct of the Members of
Pittsburgh Congregation which the Synod at
their present instance cannot unravel; insomuch
as charging Mr Barr by their representatives with
certain faults and afterward in declaring his inno-
cence, by the subscription of the individual Mem-
ber of the said Congregation together with their in-
tention again to receive Mr Barr as their Minister
Because there are charges insinuated in those papers
against the said Presbytery which the Synod
conceive ought to be made known to them that
they may have it in their power to confront the
Witnesses, that no ex parte testimony may be ad-
mitted in the case — The Synod therefore adju-
dicate the consideration of the whole affair ^{denon-}
to the Rev'd Mr. James Sowers, Shadrach Dodd,
James Dunlop, Edward Crawford, John Mont-
gomery, Meyer Hoge, & Col. Robert Whiteelder,
or any three of the whole number as a com-
mittee of Synod: — And the Synod recom-
mend it to the said Committee to be as careful
as possible with regard to the nature of the ^{some} evi-
dence which they admit upon the occasion; that no
appearances of party spirit or prejudice may
exist in the decision.

The Committee is appointed to meet at Pittsburgh
on the fourth Sunday of November next
Mr Barr is directed to give notice to the parties
concerned about Pittsburgh of this Resolution
of the Synod — And Messrs. Wm. Millan & Finley
are directed to give notice to the parties concerned
in the bounds of Redstone Presbytery contiguous
to them — And the Ministers who ap-
peared against Mr Barr before the Presbytery
of Redstone are to have notice to specify the time
and places of the respective charges — and Mr
Barr also is to specify his charges against the
members of the congregation against whom he
complains — This interchange of notice
to be at least ten days before the meeting of
the Committee of Synod

The Report of the Committee for preparing a
draught of a plan for sending forth Missionaries
was resumed and agreed upon which is as fol-
lows viz.

The Synod taking into serious consideration the state
of the vacant congregations within their bounds
and seeing with much concern the miserable state
of multitudes who have none to break the bread
of life amongst ^{them} and are perishing for lack of
knowledge; and being affected with the situa-
tion of the youth upon whom the hope of the

Church in future seems to depend; who are likely
to be brought up in ignorance and prophanity;
desirous to remedy these evils as far as practicable
in dependence upon the great head of the Church
have resolved to adopt the following Plan —

1. That we will take all ^{possible} care to seek for
Men of Knowledge Integrity and Piety who may
travel throughout our bounds, as Missionaries
to preach the gospel, to catechise and instruct
the youth and to discharge such other parts of
of Ministerial Duty as they may be authorized to
perform —

2. That there shall be a Committee of Synod ap-
pointed, consisting of four Ministers and four
Elders who shall be called the Commission of Syn-
od to receive the recommendations of such
Men from the respective Presbyteries, to exa-
mine into their credentials and fitness for the
discharge of such an office and who shall give
them such directions and instructions as the
exigencies of different places may require that
they shall meet annually and oftener if thought
necessary; and that any two Ministers and
as many Elders of the Commission as shall be
convened at the place appointed shall have suffi-
cient power to proceed to business.

3. That it shall be recommended to the different
Presbyteries to raise such contributions as they
may be able in their respective bounds; which

shall be put into a general fund for the
Support of such Missionaries —
So That there shall be a Treasurer appointed in
whose hands the money raised by the different
Presbyteries shall be deposited, who shall keep a
fair Book of Account, give and take receipts
for all money received or paid away by him
and shall make a return to the Commission of
Synod or to the Synod as often as may be re-
quired. And that he pay out such sums upon the
order of the Commission to the different Mis-
ionaries as may be appropriated to them —
and all those collections or donations that
may be received by the different Missionaries
from the Societies, shall be accounted for by
the said Missionaries to the Commission of Synod

The Committee of the Synod of Virginia having

been prevented from meeting yesterday agreeably to the appointment of synod because of the badness of the roads and the inclemency of the weather met this morning at the house of Mr David Watson at 10 o'clock

The committee was constituted by prayer
The Revd Mr Dodd was chosen chairman and
Mr Montgomery Clerk. Mr Francis Hindman
a Preacher of the Gospel from Lewis Presbytery
occasionally present, was appointed assistant
clerk -

Upon Motion - ordered that the Minutes of
synod appointing this committee be read;
which was read accordingly. - From which
it appears that a number of reasons had been
laid before the Presbytery of Redstone by the
Rev'd Mr Ward why he should be dismissed
from his pastoral relation to the United Con-
gregation of Pittsburgh and Pitts-Township
viz. 1 Because he professes he may preach
the gospel elsewhere with more freedom
2 Because he has not been able to exercise church

Discipline having too few to support him in that branch of his Duty —

3 Because no active measures have been taken by the trustees to comply with their agreement, but on the contrary have appointed him to collect his own Salary for the last year, which was as much as to say he might hunt after his Salary from Door to Door; It was none of his business —

It because Robert Galbreath and John Wilkins Esqrs Elders of the Church have not supported Character or becoming their Office; but have indulged themselves in drinking and Card-Playing — Mr Wilkins is charged with being idle with audience and Mr Galbreath has not settled his accounts with him for stipends collected by him from October 1785 until April 1787 —

4 Because William Tuning Elder besides has not paying strict attention to his Work has not been faithful in altering his neighbourland Mask, which betray a countours disposition and concerning one who should be an example to the flock

Lastly. That since his application, he still had more reason to continue his resolution, from the indisposition of the above named Gentlemen, together with George Wallace Esq. to render his labours useless both here and elsewhere by circulating false reports and preventing the Congregation and himself from worshipping God in a peaceable manner in the house of worship on the lords Day

And also that a number of Chagers had been
exhibited by the Session & Trustees of Pittsburgh
Congregation against the Revd Samuel Barrin
consequence of his application to the Presbytery
for a Dismission from the united Congregations
of Pittsburgh and Pitts-Southernburgh
in compliance with a notification from
Presbytery to the Session and Trustees of Pitts-
burgh Congregation to send Commissioners
to shew cause, if any they had, why Mr Barr
should not be removed from his Pastoral
relation to them — The Chagers are these
viz: 1st They intend to shew that Mr Barr has
not had any reason from Pittsburgh Congre-
gation to make any such application for a
Dismission —

2 They intend to shew that Mr Barr has
not done his duty as a Clergyman to his
Congregation, by absenting himself from
them at Sunday Times without the consent
of Session or Congregation or leave obtained
or his business abroad known to them —

3 They intend to shew that Mr Barr has
not done his duty as a Clergyman, by
not visiting the families of his Congregation
at their houses & in not catechising & ex-
amining them as he ought to have done

It they intend to their that Mr Barr has collect-^{ed}
ed a considerable sum of Money in Philadelphia
& N. York for the use of Pittsburgh Congrega-
tion and has never rendered any account for
the same, nor paid any part of it into the
hands of the trustees or to any other person for
the use of S. J. Congregation —

The Committee proceeded to enquire whether
the parties had complied with the direction of Synod
in giving regular notice to each other
Mr George Wallace informed the Committee that
he had regular Notice by Mr Barr — Mr John
Wilkison being enquired at, delivered to the com-
mittee the following notes which he said he had
from Mr Barr Viz. Saturday morning

Sir, Having arrived here a few days ago
from the Synod of Virginia, and being desired
by them to communicate their resolution
respecting my affair to the parties concerned
in my prosecution in Pittsburgh I would be
much obliged to you to appoint an hour &
place this forenoon where I shall meet with
you and the rest who can conveniently meet
to receive information on the business or if you
choose first to meet by ourselves and converse a
little of the affair — your compliance

Pittsburgh the 12th of Nov: 1789

Sir, I am directed by Synod to give notice to the parties concerned in our late dispute about Pittsburgh, that a Committee of Synod is appointed to meet at Pittsburgh the 1st of January of next to consider the affair de roro. I am also to inform you that the witnesses who appeared against me at our last meeting are required by Synod to specify the times & places of the respective charges made there against me at least ten days before the meeting of the Committee of Synod. As you gave testimony at that time against me I hope you will comply with this direction of Synod. If you are desirous to see the resolution of Synod you may be satisfied in that respect either by calling on me at my own Room, or by appointing me to meet you at any convenient time and place

Mr Robert Galbreath Esqr produced a few lines^{2d} from Mr Barr to the same purport with those to Mr Wilkins —

The former Prosecutor or Supporter of the aforesaid charges against Mr Barr before the Presbytery of Redstone viz. Mrs John Wilkins, Robert Galbreath & George Wallace Esqr being called upon collectively and severally (being present) intirely declined and do decline to have any hand either collect-
ively or severally now to support these charges against Mr Barr —

It was further proclaimed audibly to all pre-
sent, that if any one would step forth as an
Advocate to support those charges against Mr
Barr, that the Committee would hear him
or them — But to this no one answered
The same Gentleman aforesaid declared before
the Committee, that they would never have
exhibited any charges against Mr Barr had
they not been afraid, that if Mr Barr left them
without blame that some arrears due to Mr
Barr would still continue a burden upon the
Congregation; or in their own words he
saddled upon the congregation. The Commit-
tee adjourned with prayer, until to morrow
morning at 9 o'clock

Thursday Morning 9 o'clock the Committee
met according to adjournment — Present
as above — Constituted with prayer

Upon Motionⁿ ordered that the Minutes of yesterday be read — which was done accordingly
 Ordered likewise that Mr Barr now read the papers which he produced before Synod, & offer what further evidence he has to exculpate himself from the charges laid against him —

Mr Barr produced and read a number of papers and had a number of evidences present —
 The Committee deferred hearing part of Mr Barr's papers for the present, — And adjourned with prayer until to morrow morning 9 O'Clock

Friday morning 9 O'Clock

The Committee met accordingly to a adjournment — present as above — Constituted with Prayer — Ordered that the Minutes of yesterday be read — which was done accordingly

Ordered likewise that Mr Barr produce with his papers and evidence —
 A remonstrance from the Congregation of Pittstown ship was laid before the Committee signed unanimously by the congregation consisting of 160 subscribers Members of said congregation — also Testimonials from the Session of said congregation, verified by their Clerk & supported before us — Witnessing

that Mr Barr had in all respects acquitted himself to their satisfaction in the duties of preaching, chatechising, visiting &c & expressing their desire that he should return as their pastor — A remonstrance from the congregation of Pittsburgh was also laid before the Committee signed by upwards of 60 subscribers. Members of said congregation and by some who appeared as witnesses against Mr Barr at his former trial before the Presbytery of Edstone Mr. Col. Tannahill Gen. Gibson, & Mr. Kirkpatrick, & was supported before us; witnessing that Mr Barr had behaved himself well and discharged the duties of his office to their satisfaction and expressing their desire that Mr Barr should return to be their Minister.

Mr Barr informs the Committee of Synod that he regularly visited the families, & publicly chatechised in the congregations of Pittsburgh yearly since he became their pastor — That he attempted shortly after his settlement to visit the families in the congregation of Pittsburgh, but finding the people did not desire it, he resolved to try another method which was to chatechise the young people at church, which practice he has since adhered to as may be more fully seen in the remonstrance

W^r David Duncan being solemnly called upon to declare the truth, answered to the following questions —

1. W^r Barr asked W^r Duncan at what time he heard Gen. Gibson ask W^r Barr whether he would baptise the children of Episcopalian who were subscribers to the congregation — W^r Duncan answered that he heard either Gen. Gibson or W^r Smith ask the question some time in the summer before. W^r Barr settled in Pittsburgh

2 Did you understand from my conversation at that time, that I was to baptise them, hardly at the recommendation of Committee or if you did not understand me as reserving a power to myself of enquiring into their knowledge and qualifications — W^r Duncan answered that he understood W^r Barr as retaining that power —

3 Did not the Committee of Pittsburgh express their desire that I would not connect myself with the Presbytery on this side of the mountains — W^r Duncan answered. It appears to me that it was the wish of the Committee at that time

4 Did you hear any reasons from the Committee for expressing such a desire?

— Mr Duncan replied. The reasons he could not well remember but they looked more like Presbytery as rather rigid

5. Did Mr Duncan hear me say at that time the Presbytery of Redstone were people of contracted minds? Answer not that I remember

6. Mr Barr asked Did Mr Duncan at that time hear me say any thing farther than as the people here had instained an unfavourable opinion of Presbytery. I would not be in a hurry of connecting myself with them till I had an opportunity of further acquaintance?

Mr Duncan answered. I heard him say that he would not be in a hurry connecting himself with them and farther I remember not

7th Mr Barr asked was you present at a meeting of Committee when Gen. Gibson asked my reason for refusing to permit him to present his Child to Baptism — I replied yes

8th Did I not inform Gen. Gibson that it was not a proper time to speak of that matter but that I would give him my reasons if he would call upon me at another time.

I answered Yes

9. Did you not hear Gen. Gibson frequently say that he would not submit to any retrospective View of his conduct before the establishment of the Church in this place? Ans. Yes

10 Do you remember of my endeavouring
to have a rule established by Committee for
admitting persons to ordinances who had for-
merly been irregular in their conduct. Yes
It was that rule rejected by Committee - Yes

12 Did you previous to my coming to Pitts-
burgh hear the people belonging to the con-
gregations of the Revd Mr W. Millan called
Mr Millanites? Answered. Yes

13 Did you ever hear me call them by that
name? Answered. No

ter which may have arisen between the Revd.
Samuel Ward and me, that I am perfectly
reconciled and satisfied as will further ap-
pear by the remonstrance I have signed

It appeared from a deposition of Mary Andrew
taken before Mr Wallace Egge & acknowledged
by him that the said Mary Andrew declared
that previous to Mr Ward coming to settle
in Pittsburgh she heard the people belong-
ing to the Revd. Mr Wallace long, regation called
the Wallacites: and that they were a
contracted set of people in respect of their
religious principles, and that whenever
heard Mr Ward make use of the appellation
It appeared also from ~~from~~ the depositions of
Alexander & George Hawley Egge taken before
Mr Wallace Egge that sometime in the Month
of November or Decr 1785 these deponents
were in the company of the Revd Sam. Ward

and others who were invited to Supper to the
House of Whorge Wallly and after the Com-
pany were collected severals of them began to
play at Cards and these Deponents heard
Mr. Ward mention in publick his disapproba-
tion of card-playing; and wished when the
Gentlemen would meet they might spend
their time better than in card-playing by
forming themselves into companies for the
purpose of improvement in Political or re-
ligious ^{Matthew} knowledge in place of card-play-
ing, which if they followed, they must not
expect his company; as such a practice was
disagreeable to him; and immediately after
Supper, he withdrew from the House; and
further say they never saw the aforesaid
Samuel Ward, meet in any Company where
Cards were played after ^{on the} the above De-
positions are affirmed upon ^{oath} to be taken by
him according to law.

Capt. Alexander Fowler being required to an-
swer to the following question upon the
Oath he had already taken — Mr. Ward.
Did Capt. Fowler hear me express my con-
tumacy both in publick and private on the
subject of Card-playing? Ans. Yes.

2^d What were those sentiments? answered.
He constantly disapproved and censured the
practice

3^d Did Capt. Hawker ever know me to countenance
Card-playing or night revelling? answered.
I never did.

Mr Wallace also upon his solemn affirmation,
declared, that he heard the Revd Samuel Barr
disapprove of Card-playing & night revell-
ing in publick & in private — Mr Barr ask-
ed him Did Mr Wallace any time since the
winter of 1786 see me present at the time of
Card-playing — Ans^d. Not to my knowledge
Col. Wayard also being interrogated upon
the same subject answered upon oath
to the following questions —

1^d Was Col. Wayard present
at Mr McCullly's the evening referred to?
Answered. Yes

2^d Did it appear to Col.
Wayard that I dropped in by accident, or in conse-
quence of an invitation to supper? Ans^d.
On consequence of an invitation to supper

3^d Was there a number of the Company en-
gaged in playing Cards? Answered. Yes

4^d Now Did it appear to relish it? Ans^d. Not well

5^d Has Col. Wayard heard me afterward com-
plain, that any one should invite me to

his Wife and treat me in such a Manner;
answ^d Yes I have — 6th Did not Col.
Psayard at that time hear me reason with
the Company against Card-playing?
answ^d Yes — 7th Was I opposed by
any Person in the Company? Answ^d You
I remember the observation of one Gen-
tlemen in particular, who said he would
not give up ^{at least} Whist for the Company of
Sir Isaack Newton or the greatest Man of
the Age — 8th Did you know me to en-
courage Card-playing and night revel-
lings? Answ^d No quite the contrary —
9th Did I ever permit or encourage Col.
Psayard as an Elder to play Cards?
Answ^d By no means —

A Certificate relative to this Matter was pro-
duced with W^r Abraham Kirkpatrick's signature
authenticated by W^r Wallace saying, "I do cer-
tify that the time and place allude to in my ob-
^{evidence} respecting the Revd Samuel Barr was
at Major W^r Culley's some time in the Month of
November or December 1785 when a number of
Gentlemen were invited to sup and spend the

evening. And I do further certify that it then
appeared to me from the drift of his conver-
sation that Mr. Barr's design was not to coun-
tenance or encourage gambling or card play
but by degrees to gain upon the affections of
the Gentlemen, & at last to prevail on them to
relinquish what they were then & had been long
attached to — A. Kirkpatrick

Then Mr. Barr further asked Col. Bayard. 1st Were
the Elders nominated by me or chosen by the
People by Ballot? Answer. By the Ballot of the
People — 2^d Does Col. Bayard believe I had
any reason to ask a dismission from the con-
gregation of Pittsburgh? Answer. Yes. Mr. Barr
frequently before informed me of his dismis-
sion in the congregation. 3^d Did I ever consult
with you as a Member of Session about the
spiritual matters of the congregation? Answ.
Yes frequently. 4th Does Col. Bayard re-
member of being called to hear any person
examined by me, who had applied for the
privileges of the Church? Answer. Yes several
times. — 5th Do you remember of any other
Member of Session being also present upon
the occasion? Answer. Yes there were. —
6th Was it usual for persons applying for li-
censes with whom Mr. Barr was unacquainted
or had not formerly been admitted to apply

Ans'd. I always understood it so. Qst Did Col.
Wayard hear me say before my going to Phi-
ladelphia last winter that I would leave the
Congregation of Pittsburgh? Ans'd. Yes &
I expressed my concern at your leaving the

Capt. Fowler was then interrogated. 1st Does
Capt. Fowler believe I had reason to ask ad-
mission from the Congregation of Pittsburgh?
Ans'd. I do. — 2^d Have you not frequently
heard me say before I applied for a dismis-
sion, that I would leave the Congregation?
Ans'd. I have often. — 3^d Have you heard me
express myself so in the presence of others also?
Ans'd. I heard you express ^{it} once in Mr Wilkins
office in the presence of Mr Wilkins and others.
Qst At what time did I express myself so in Mr
Wilkins office? Ans'd. So the best of my knowledge
some time between last fall. — 5th Did you
hear me on a late occasion offer to give my
reasons for my conduct to Gen. Gibson respect-
ing the baptism of his child? Ans'd. I did hear
you offer to give reasons to the Presbytery
upon your trial. 6th Was I admitted to give
my reasons? Ans'd. You were not.

7th Why was I refused? Ans^d. Mr. Gallbreath opposed you and insisted that it was imp-

made out and the Gentlemen commissioned

Presbytery for his Dismission? Ans^d Geo.
Mr Jacob Mire being solemnly called upon
to declare the truth saith. That he was em-
ployed by Mr John Wilkins to erect a pulpit

trial that a Charge was intended to be brought
against me by Mr. Wilkins and others, that
I had collected a considerable sum of Money
in N. York & Philadelphia and had never
rendered any account of the same nor
paid any part to the Trustee nor to any
Person for the use of the Church? Ans^d Yea.
and I informed you of it previous to the
Charge being brought. It Did I at that
time order you to inform Mr. Wilkins that
I was willing and desirous to settle that ac-
count and any other pecuniary account
subsisting between me and the Congregation?

Mr. Wallace then answered to the follow-

5th Did I not say that if the key were given up, I would give any notice from the pulpit, that they desired, in order that there might be a meeting of the congregation to know if it was their mind that I should not preach any longer to them? Answ. It appear to me there was such conversation 6th Was not this given as one reason for detaining the key, that it would put an additional expence upon the congregation presuming that my year was then up? Answ. Yes — 7th Did I not say that I would make no charge for the time I preached

till I could go away? Ans^d. Yes — 50
Did you understand that the Key was given
up the following Sabbath to the People on their
application for it? Ans^d. Yes —

9. Did the People request the Key for
Mr Barr to preach? Ans^d. Yes —

10. Were the Congregation consulted before
the detention of the Key? Ans^d. No —

The Committee at the request of Mr Barr
agreed to insert the following paragraph in
their Minutes. Viz. Mr Barr requested that
the Committee of Synod will please to enter
on their minutes, that from the face of
the judgment of Redstone Presbytery against
me, I did not consider myself suspended
from the exercise of my Office, nor did
they inform me what they understood
by it.

The Committee then agreed to the follow-
ing Determination —

This Committee finding, that the mem-
ber who composed the Presbytery of which
formerly sat on Mr Barr's Trial did not
attend and it not appearing to the Com-
mittee whether or not they considered them
selves as having legal notice; and find-
ing

5^o) that Mr Barr's former Prosecutors did not
wish to appear in any form against him
in the Trial; the Committee then proceeded
to attend to the papers produced by Mr Barr
duly attested & a number of personal eviden-
ce which tended to give light to the sub-
ject; and having compared these with the
Minutes of Prestytery which sat upon his
former trial, finding Matters to stand in
different views. Therefore the Committee de-
termine that the Charges exhibited by the
Session & Trustees of Pittsburgh Congrega-
tion against Mr Barr are wholly un-
supported and that he be considered in
full and regular standing in the Church.

The Synod accepted the Report of the
Committee as now amended and consider
Mr Barr in Regular standing in the Church

Upon a review of the conduct of Mr Barr
itself in Pittsburgh the Synod were of Opin-
ion that John Wilkins Robert Gilbreath
and George Wallace Esq^r having acted in a
manner unbecoming Men and Christians
in the Prosecution of Mr Barr as appear

from their own confession of the motives which prevailed with them to prosecute Mr Barr & also in the deception imposed by them upon the Presbytery of Redstone should not enjoy the privilege of the Church in our communion; until they testify repentance for their un worthy conduct and receive a public rebuke for the same before the church by a regular Minister who shall be appointed by the Presbytery of Redstone for that purpose.

The Commission of Synod laid their pro cedings before Synod which were approved of and the synod urge it upon their members to exert themselves in raising contributions to promote so laudible a design.

Mr Wilson is appointed a member of the Commission of Synod in the room of Mr Scott.

They further reported that last Summer they had six Missionaries, chiefly employed in riding in the bounds of Hanover and Lexington Presbyteries, one of whom by permission travelled in the bounds of Abingdon Presbytery — All these Missionaries appear to have been much blessed in drawing the attention of the people to the means of grace, and in several places hopeful appearances of person awakened and fired up to serious concern about their souls, and that in some places churches are likely to be formed. They reported further that lately one of the Missionaries had resigned, but that two others had put themselves under their care and direction —

The Synod heard their report with pleasure, and highly approved the attention, zeal, and fidelity of the Commission, & their Missionaries; and recommended to the Commission to make out a report of such parts of the success of their Missionaries, as they may judge to Edification, to lay before the next General Assembly —

are led forth in Arms. No! Brother is under
the unhappy necessity of rising up in arms
against Brother; & Father, (if Heaven in
mercy prevent not) may too probably have
to shed the blood of his Son, & the Son the
blood of his Father. Surely we ought to
enquire why it is, that the sword of the Lord
is unsheathed, & suspended over our own
happy Country. We ought by no means
to confine our views to the immediate cause,

of our distress. They are the sword, the hand
in thine! Yes we with our Fathers have
sinned. In how many instances is the stan-
dard of revolt lifted up against the Throne
of God himself? How many imprecations an
every day aimed at the life & soul of our
Holy Creator? How is the day of Holyness
profaned by guilty amusements & secu-
lar employments? Because of swearing, curs-
ing, lying, & Sabbath breaking & other crimes
unnumerable the Land mourns. Surely then
we ought to confess our sins, & mourn also.
Yes! we & our people ought to mourn over our
transgressions, amend our ways, & turn to
the Lord with our whole heart. We recom-
mend it to you Dear Brother, to exhort the
people under your care in the great & endur-
ing name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to observe
with religious attention this important duty
exhort the Magistrates to put the Laws in ex-

action against Sabbath breakers & other infractions cognizable by them, as far as their office, & in ^{the} limits may extend; & agreeably to the express command of God, without the people to be subject to the powers that be, & to manifest the zeal of good citizens by using their influence to suppress all disorders which may have arisen to undermine the foundation of our happy Government & distract the peace of Civil Society. Who knows but the Lord will be intrusted on our behalf & in behalf of our bleeding Country, turn from us his just displeasure, remove his chastising hand - avert the calamities of civil war, & bless our confederate States with peace". —

The Synod adjourned to meet at this place tomorrow morning
9 o'clock. Concluded with prayer.

Thursday morning 9 o'clock. The Synod met accord-
ing to adjournment, and was constituted with prayer. — Members present as above.

175 The Minutes of our last Session were read. The System of Rules for regulating & governing the Synod in their deliberations, not being had when the Synod met, I now bring brought forward, was, on motion, read. — ~~We have made~~
WILLIAMSON after his opinion at the morning
Meeting of this Session when here in Service in
the Synod & from many what he has said, when
he conversed with this synod, he informed the Synod
that he had consulted with the members before him in the
Synod, which he thought firm & bent to the same Rule.

The Synod then enquired of their stated Clerk whether
he had complied with the order at their last meeting con-
joining enjoining it upon him to write to the Penn-
sylvania Phy directing them to bring forward their re-
sponds, and was informed that he had given every necessary
information to the said Phy. but not in writing.

The Synod called upon the Phy. to report & upon being infor-
med that they were not ready, ordered them to report the same.
The Synod then enquired of its members whether they had
complied with the recommendation at their last meeting to
observe the afternoon of the first Tuesday in every quarter
of the year, as a time of prayer; when it appeared that this
recommendation was generally attended to. — The Synod
called upon their Commissioners to make report. — The Com-
mission East of the Alleghany reported as follows — That they
had, since they last reported, only two missionaries under
their care viz. Mr. Robert Stewart who still continues
an invalid & therefore demands no Salary, and Mr.

James Robinson who has officiated since last June chiefly 176
labouring in the Counties of Rockbridge, Amherst, Alleghany,
& Greenbland. — The Majority for & encouragement to mis-
sionaries appears great in many places, & some hopeful
prospects of a blessing attending Mr. Robinson's preaching
in Alleghany & Amherst has appeared. No report from the
Commission West of the Alleghany. The Synod enquired
of its members whether they had taken care to raise contribu-
tions for the support of missionaries, and was informed that
they had generally attended to this business. — The Synod
adjourned to meet at this place this afternoon at 3 o'clock.
Concluded with prayer.

Thursday afternoon 3 o'clock. The Synod met according to adjourn-
ment & was constituted with prayer. Members present as above.

And the Committee of Overtures was laid before the Synod
the following Overture Viz. May the children of any be baptised
but those whose parents are admissible to full communion in
the church. — The Synod determined that this Overture had already
been answered in the negative at a former meeting of Synod.
And as there is too much reason to fear that this decision of
Synod was not attended to in many parts of the church by
the Synod Resolved to adopt the Ref^d. under their care upon
that subject, and accordingly appointed Eliphalet Leland, Pitt,
Williamson & Brown a committee to draw up an edict
suitable to the occasion. — The Synod again called
upon the Ref^d. to make their reports — The Ref^d. of Kenova
reported as follows Viz. That they consisted of nine ordained
ministers Viz. The Rev^d. S. J. Waddell without a charge

177 Wm. Ervin without a charge, Archl'l Roberts without a charge, for & little having the Pastoral charge of Bethel Salem & Pisgah, James Turner colleague with Wm. Littleton Jr. D. Blair having the Pastoral charge of Hanover & Dennis, Avery Lucy of that of Cumberland, Archl'l Alexander of Breyer & Matthew Lyle of Buffalo & Bricy in conjunction with Mr. Alexander. — They have one candidate for the gospel ministry viz. John Todd. — They have received Mr. Samuel Ramsey a probationer from the Lexington Presbytery under their care. — They have several small vacancies, none of which are of themselves able to support a Pastor. — But some of them that are contiguous being united are sufficiently able viz. North Fork, Providence & the Ried united would be able — Mountain Plains, the Cove & Rockfish united are able — Old Concord & New Concord united are able — Sandy River, Tomahawk & New Cusson united are able — Good-Hope, Smiths River, God's Meeting House, Blue Stone, Lancaster, Cub-Creek & the D. & appointed Mr. for Houston Le Grand & Lyle a Committee to
draft a letter suitable to the occasions.

From the Com'te of Bantams was brought forward
a proposition to enlarge the bounds of the Wimber-
ley Presy by the addition of the remainder of
the northern neck which belonged to the Presy of Han-
over, & the following is established as its Sacretth
in line Vizt. Beginning at Swift run gap, then
a straight line to the head sources of the Rapid-

was taken up by the Synod & agreed to. By the same Committe
there was also another as follows - Shall those persons who have

for such conduct? The Synod agreed to discuss this subject; but
the members of Synod not finding themselves prepared for the
discussion of this subject at present; it was agreed to defer
the further consideration of it till the next meeting of Synod;
and the Synod enjoin it upon the Presbyteries under their

181 can to pay particular attention to this subject between
this and our next meeting, that they might come up prepared
for the discussion. — The Synod having received no
mood nor accounts from the Treasury Board they ordered
their Stated Clerk once more to write to that Body to
send forward their mood for the inspection of Synod.

The Synod adjourned to meet at this place tomorrow
morning at 9 o'clock. Concluded with prayer.

Friday Morning 9 o'clock. The Synod met agreeably
to adjournment & was constituted with prayer. Members
present as above, with the addition of W^t Hoge whose reasons
for not attending earlier on this occasion were sustained.
Col. John Monroe an Elder with W^t Hoge also appeared
took his seat. — The Synod enquired of their Commission,
whom they ordered at their last meeting to settle the account
of their Treasury & make report at the present meeting,
whether they had complied with their order, and were in
found that in consequence of some of the Commissioners not
fully understanding the wish of Synod, they were not
ready to report — On Motion M^r J^r Houston & Keeler
were appointed a Committee to attend to this business &
make report at the next meeting. — The Committee
appointed to draught a letter to the Presbyteries, calling
upon them an attention to a former decision of Synod, re-
ported, which is as follows Viz.

Dear Brethren, The Synod of Virginia having at a former
meeting declared their sentiments respecting the quali-
fications of those who are admissible to the Seats of

the Covenant of Grace & whom children ought to be ⁸² Baptized
(a copy of which is hereto annexed) and having then earnestly re-
commended to their Members a due attention to that important
point - we are sorry to find that there is still reason to fear
this has not been duly regarded, and hence have arisen not
only scandals against the Church, but very considerable dif-
ficulties to those who wish to act agreeably to that deter-
mination. And being still unanimously of opinion that this
decision referred to is consonant to the word of God and calcu-
lates to be productive of very beneficial consequences to his
Church; we again earnestly entreat your attention to this
very important matter. Consider the propriety, not to say
the absolute necessity, that the Stewards of Christ's house
should act agreeably to his instructions. Consider the vast ad-
vantage which would arise from a strict uniformity as well
in practice as sentiment amongst ourselves in every doctrine
& in every article of discipline. Hence by the hands of them
who would be much strengthened, Christ's Body edified, and
we doubt not but a witness of the reality, purity and ex-
cellence of religion left in the breasts of many that are
without by the faithfulness of the Stewards of the Mystery
of God. That the Purity of his Religion may be maintained;
that the glory of God in the salvation of sinners may be
illustriously displayed & the Kingdom of the Redeemer
mighty advanced is the fervent prayer of your ^{Reverend} Brethren
in the Lord. —— The Synod agreed to receive
and adopt the above address.

The Synod received information from Mr. James

143 Name that he wishes to resign his office as a Member
of the Commission of Synod, and agreed to receive his resig-
nation & appointed Mr. Alexander in his stead.

On motion the Synod agreed to continue their recom-
mendation for observing the afternoon of the first tue-
day in every quarter of the year as a time of pray-
er & supplication for a revival of religion, until our
next meeting. — The Synod agreed to have a ser-
mon after Service —

Mfrs. Mitchell, Houston & Brown informed the Synod
that they had business of a very urgent nature to attend
to as Trustees of Liberty-Hall Academy and requested
leave of absence for the rest of this meeting — Which
request was granted —

The Synod adjourned to meet at this place this afternoon
at 3 o'clock. — Concluded with prayer. —

Friday afternoon 3 o'clock. The Synod met agreeably
to adjournment & was constituted with prayer.
Members present as above.

The Committee appointed to draw up a letter to
the Presbyteries enjoining upon them a more punctual
attendance upon Synod for the future, brought in
the following letter which was read & approved of by

To the Mod: of the Presbytery of
Sic. The great neglect of members to attend at this

mating of Synod, presents to us such an alarming prospect that we judge it our duty to urge the Bdg. composing this body to press upon their members to be more careful in attending our meetings than they have been heretofore.

We cannot suppose they have concluded to let the authority of Jesus Christ as King in his Church fall to the ground. Yet if the members of each Bdg. had become a little more careful, we will cease to have synodical meetings. — Already the reduced state of our body occasioned by the delinquency of its members, sinks our dignity; weakens our influence, & greatly discourages the hearts of such as attend.

If it is a duty to attend & every member has so solemnly vowed this in his ordination it must be an important duty; therefore we cannot think the King & head of the Church will for small inconveniences of Members & for difficulties that may be got over, look upon those men quitters who do not attend. He has commanded his servants to be faithful in following him even until death. How can there be judged such who seldom appear with their fellow-servants in the vineyard to do the

185 the business which every one is bound to do
as much as his neighbour. At this meeting
two whole Pby's are absent & of two more only a
member from each have attended. We therefore
enjoin it upon our Pby's to take such measures
with their members as may if possible for the future
prevent such a delinquency of Members in attending
Synod. That the Head of the Church may keep
all his servants & make them duly faithful is
our earnest prayer.

The Synod ordered their Stated Clerk to fur-
nish each Pby with a copy of this letter & also
a copy of the address urging a uniformi-
ty of sentiment & practice respecting the assign-
tion of persons to privileges in the Church

The Synod adjourned to meet at Win-
chester the last Wednesday in Septem-
