Winchester Sept<sup>r</sup> 26<sup>th</sup> 1778

The Synod of Virginia met according to adjournment & was opened with a Service from Decr. 9<sup>th</sup> & 10<sup>th</sup> by the Revd James Dunlap after which Synod was constituted with proper Members present - From the Presby of Redstone The Revd James Dunlap, John W Phenin & Jacob Jennings. Ministers.

The Presby of Ohio The Revd John McMillan, James Hughes & Thos Marquis Ministers  
The Presby of Pennsylvania The Revd - James Ramper, James Welch & Wm Calhoon

The Presby of Winchester The Revd Wm Hill John Lyle & William Williamson Ministers & Timothy Sewell & Wm Buckels Elders.

The Presbyteries of Hanover & Lexington wholly absent.

The Synod proceeded to the choice of a Moderator & the Revd Wm Williamson was chosen Moderator & the Revd James Hughes & James Welch Clerks. Agreeably to order the minutes of the last meeting of Synod were read.

The Rev<sup>d</sup> Moses Hoge & Nash Lgrand Minis-  
ters & Lewis Stephens an Elder with Mr L-  
grand being now come took their seats,  
their reasons for not attending sooner were  
sustained.

The reasons of Messrs McMillan  
McPherson, Jennings, Hugh Marquis Cal-  
hoon Hamper & Welch for absence at for-  
mer meetings of Synod were sustained.

On Motion Messrs Inc McMillan Inc McPherson  
Wm Calhoon, Moses Hoge Minister & Timothy  
Smell Elder were appointed a Committee of  
overtures to prepare business for the Synod  
at their present meeting & ordered to meet to-  
morrow morning at 9 o'clock & afterwards  
on their own adjournments.

On Motion, The Phys were ordered to bring  
forward their reports next Friday morning  
Upon inquiry it was found that the mem-  
bers had attended to & complied with the re-  
commendation of Synod, setting apart the

afternoon of the first Tuesday in every quarter of the year for the exercise of prayer  
On Motion it was agreed to continue the said recommendation until the next meeting of Synod.

On Motion Missrs Marquis & Legrand were appointed a Committee to examine the records of Redstone Rly - Miss<sup>rs</sup> Jennings & Hill to examine the records of Ohio Rly & to make report before the rising of Synod.

On Motion the Synod adjourned to meet tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock  
Concluded with prayer -

Thursday morning 9 o'clock - The Synod met agreeably to adjournment, & was constituted with prayer. Members present as above  
Agreeably to order the minutes of last Session were read.

<sup>4</sup> The Commission of Synod West of the Allegheny made report as follows; That N.W. of the Ohio & Allegheny rivers a number of settlements are made & societies formed; that a door appears to be opened for preaching the gospel in various places, that the Commission have in store something considerable for the support of Missionaries, but as yet have no Missionary; that they have however sent sufficient supplies by settled Ministers to the settlements & that there appears to be an increasing desire for the gospel among them. The Synod received the above report as satisfactory. —

Inquiry being made at the members of Synod respecting their attention to raising contributions for the support of Missionaries, it appeared that they had generally attended thereto.

The Stated Clerk having failed to comply with an order made at the last meeting of Synod, to forward certain letters addressed to the several Presbs on motion by me was again

ordered to forward said letters as soon as convenient.

The Synod proceeded to consider the question referred from the last meeting and after some deliberation the Synod agreed to dismiss it, as in their opinion it is sufficiently answered in their book of discipline.

A report was made to the Synod of the State of the Seminary in Washington County Pennsylvania which was satisfactory, & from which it appears that the said Seminary is in a flourishing & promising condition.

A petition was presented to the Synod thru the Committee of Overtures from the Pby of Transylvania praying a division of said Pby into three Pbys to be known by the names of Transylvania bounded on the N. & E. by Kentucky River on the N. & N. W. by the Ohio, & southwardly comprehending all the settlements & its waters. Consisting of the following members.

M. when the Rev'd David Rice or in case of his absence the Senior Member present shall open Pby with a Sermon & preside untill a Moderator be chosen. —

gey into the state of religion in these churches  
over their bounds & such information being  
received as the members had to communicate  
It appeared that altho' the state of religion  
in many places is lamentable & even when  
some time since it flourished, & that vice

¶ immorality do much abound, yet in other  
places God hath graciously visited his vine  
yard, & poured forth on Zion's thirsty hill the  
refreshing showers of his grace. And it was  
particularly remarked that in those places  
where particular attention had been paid  
to the exercise of social prayer, especially on  
the stated seasons recommended by the Synod  
there the cause of Christ & true religion had  
most remarkably flourished.

o'clock P. M. Concluded with prayer.

Reports were made to the Synod respecting the state of the Seminaries under their care which reports were satisfactory & the Synod were well pleased with the conduct & attention of their Trustees & the promising state of said Seminaries.

On Enquiry it appeared that the following question. How far & in what sense are persons who have been regularly baptized in infancy & have not partaken of the sacrament of the supper subject to the discipline of the Church - had been agreeably to the order of Synod at their last meeting laid before the Gen<sup>t</sup> Assembly & that the Assembly were divided of the opinion that the said question is sufficiently answered in our book of discipline.

The Synod having observed an irregularity & inconsistency in the reports of the Ohio & Redstone R. Phys, the same vacancies being in several instances included in the report from each R. C. Y. among it is presumed to the want of a complete division line. In order

to prevent in future all such inconveniences  
the Synod appointed the Rev<sup>d</sup> Messrs John Miller  
Thos Morgan, John McPherson & David Smith a  
Committee to sit upon & complete a line of  
separation between said P.b.y & to make report  
at the next meeting of Synod. —

On motion the Synod adjourned to meet  
at 9 o'clock to morrow morning.

Rev'd & Dear Brother,

A letter from your Committee enclosing a memorial from the united congregations of Concord & Concord, is now before us. And much do we lament the unhappy occasion of that address. That so many thousands of our fellow creatures should in this land of liberty, and asylum for the oppressed, be held in chain, is a reflection to us peculiarly afflictive. And most earnestly do we wish that all the members of our communion would pay a proper attention to the recommendation of the late Synod of New York & Philadelphia upon this subject. We consider it the indispensable duty of all who hold slaves to prepare by a suitable education the young among them for a state of freedom, and

35

to liberate them as soon as they shall appear  
to be duly qualified for that high privilege;  
and such as neglect a duty so evidently, & so  
powerfully, enforced by the common prin-  
ciples of justice, as well as by the dictates  
of humanity, & the benign genius of our  
holy religion, ought, in our opinion, to be  
severely dealt with, & admonished on that  
account. But to refuse to hold Christian  
communion with any who may differ  
from us in sentiment & practice in this  
instance would, we conceive, in the present  
conjunction at least, be a very unwarri-  
able procedure; a direct infraction of the  
decision of the Gen<sup>d</sup> Assembly of our Church  
& a manifest departure from the practice  
of the apostles & the primitive church.  
Nor is this all. Such a measure would,  
it appears to us, be more likely to confirm  
such as <sup>in this instance</sup> err, in their errors than to reclaim  
them.

There appears to be an evident want of precision in the reasonings of the Brethren who presented the Memorial referred to us. They consider Slavery to be a moral evil, and consequently a sufficient ground of exclusion from the communion of the Church. Nay, they represent it as a known sin, and seem evidently to intimate that the members of our church who live in the practice of it, know it to be a sin. This statement appears to be not only incorrect, but inconsistent with the plan of emancipation submitted to your consideration. If the holding any of our fellow creatures in a state of servitude be absolutely, & in every circumstance a moral evil or a sin, a total emancipation ought immediately to take place. A measure which would, there is reason to apprehend, be attended with many & great evils,

57

and that moral as well as political; and while  
their good sense & moderation did not permit  
them to recommend. That it was wrong  
in the first instance to reduce so many of  
the helpless Africans to their present state  
of thralldom, will be readily admitted, and that  
it is a duty to adopt proper measures for  
their emancipation will it is presumed,  
be universally conceded — But with respect  
to the measures best calculated to accomplish  
that important purpose, & the time most  
convenient to give them full effect, different  
sentiments may be ~~obtained~~ obtained by the true  
disciples of the great Friend of Man. And  
in this instance of doubtful discretion  
mutual forbearance & charity ought to be  
exercised toward those who differ in opinion  
on from one another. If any retain their  
slaves in a state of bondage, at the same  
time that they consider it their duty to em-  
ancipate them immediately, they are

certainly highly censurable, and deserve to be excluded from the Communion of the Church. This is, however, a charge which ought not to be advanced without sufficient evidence to support it. And the advocates for emancipation ought to beware, lest by too much precipitation they should obstruct the good work in which they are engaged. This caution seems to be peculiarly necessary at the present time, when there is so much reason to apprehend dangerous insurrections from the Black people in some of our States, & when a dangerous plot for that purpose has recently been discovered in Virginia. And may that Almighty being, who hath made of one blood all the nations upon earth dispose the hearts of all the members of our Church to do justly, and love mercy at the same time that they profess to walk humbly with God.

of party - is in the habits of intimacy with several  
tribes, whose respective languages he speaks with  
ease - Their design in sending him was to  
second the inclinations of the people, to train  
their situation & character, & pave the way  
for a mission as early as possible: That  
they have taken measures to get some of the  
young Indians to be educated & are likely  
to succeed & that they are very anxious <sup>to</sup> find  
from abroad a suitable person to undertake  
a mission to said Indian tribes, as there is no  
person in their bounds that can undertake  
such a trust.

From the whole it appeared that the  
Commissioners had exerted themselves in a laudable

that the call for missionaries appears very urgent  
in many places both among ourselves & the Indian

The Synod took up the reference of the Genl Assembly "whether it be most adviseable that the Missionary business as it has respect to the Synod of Virginia be continued in future in the manner in which it has been conducted for some time

part, or whether it would not be more adviseable that their funds should be put into those of the Genl Assembly & the Missionary business in Virginia wholly managed by the Assembly whereupon the Synod after due deliberation were of opinion that the missionary business could be best managed by the Synod, & that it would not be expedient ~~that~~ at this time to put their funds into those of the Genl Asy but that matters proceed ~~as heretofore~~ under the direction of Synod.

Agreeably to a resolve of the Commission of Synod East of the Alleghany to submit to Synod the expediency of dissolving said Commission; The Synod having taken up this subject, after mature deliberation thought from reasons assigned by the Commission & others that it would be expedient to dissolve said Commission, reserving to them the power of closing their business & of reporting at the next meeting of Synod, which they are hereby required to do.

The Synod determined that the salary given to missionaries employed by them shall be at the rate of 33 $\frac{1}{3}$  \$ per month -

The Rev<sup>d</sup> Amos Thomson was appointed a Missionary to ride under the direction of this Synod 6 Months or more if convenient in the counties of Virginia below the Blue Ridge - And Mr Comrod Spence one year both above & below the Blue Ridge in parts where no ministers are settled — Both the above Missionaries are to present to the next meeting of Synod an accurate narrative of every thing worthy the attention of Synod also <sup>an account</sup> of the money they receive from the people for their services.

The Synod recommend that all its members exert themselves to obtain generous donations from their respective charges for the purpose of defraying the wages of the above appointed missionaries & also to defray the wages of the Missionaries appointed by the General Assembly to labour the present year in our bounds.

A motion was made & seconded that this Synod petition the next Genl Assembly to divide it into three distinct synods to be known by the names of the Synod of Virginia - ~~the~~ <sup>to consist of the</sup> Presbyteries of Hanover Lexington & Winchester. The Synod of Pittsburg to consist of the Presbyt. of Redstone - Ohio - & Erie. & the Synod of Kentucky to consist of the Presb. of Transylvania - Western Lexington & Washington. which motion was carried, & the Synod ordered the Stated Clerk to transmit a copy of this resolution to the next Genl Assembly.

to appear regularly at the end of every second  
Month. The annual price of this work, was  
to be, to subscribers 1 dollar & 50 Cents and one  
fourth of its profits after defraying the necessary  
expenses of the Editors was to go into the fund

The publication commenced with the  
1<sup>st</sup> of January 1805. Four of its numbers  
have gone to the publick and the 5<sup>th</sup> is  
now in the press and it remains for the  
Synod to determine whether the work shall  
cease with the present year, or whether  
it shall be Continued - - -

Our Committee are of opinion that the maga-  
zine if conducted ~~and~~ circulated with spirit  
might be useful to the interest of Religion, &  
profitable to the funds of the Synod. But  
to answer these purposes in any high degree,  
the zealous & persevering cooperation of all the  
Members of this body will be necessary.  
The minute appointing our Committee  
taught it to expect the full support of the Synod  
in this undertaking; But the work has been  
nearly deserted by almost all the members  
of that body, excepting those who are also mem-  
bers of the Committee. Original matter has  
not been furnished in sufficient quantities to  
ensure success to the Magazine, nor has there

In order to extend the Missionary business, or make  
it practicable to send missionaries more frequently,  
and with better effect, through the state of Virginia,  
or to the Heather, and to distribute suitable  
books among them - We the subscribers do agree  
to form ourselves into a Society, & bind our-  
selves to act agreeably to the following con-  
stitution:

Art. 1. The Society is denominated "The Lexing-  
ton Missionary Society;" and its business shall  
be transacted by Managers, appointed in the  
following manner; every regularly ordained  
minister of the Presbyterian Denomination,  
within the bounds of Lexington Presbytery,  
who is willing to act, shall be a manager  
ex officio: — And whenever thirty dollars  
are subscribed in any Society or district of  
Country, not too large to admit of the  
subscribers assembling together or a majori-  
ty of them, they shall choose a Lay-  
Manager, who shall hold his office

During good behaviour, on the choice of a Manager each subscriber shall be entitled to a vote for every dollar he shall have Subscribed, & six Managers shall be competent to do business.

Art. II. It shall be the business of the Managers to choose the officers of this Society — to obtain as many signers to this Constitution as possible, & when any person signs the Constitution, it is understood that he becomes a Member of this Society — And when any Member wishes to withdraw from the Society, he shall give notice thereof to some Manager at or before the end of some year, & pay his arrears if any are due. — Every year of this Society shall be considered as beginning the first of January, and ending on the last of December — And the yearly quota of each Member shall be at least one dollar, to be paid at the commencement of the year. —

Art. III. The officers of this Society, to be chosen by the Managers, shall be a President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Clerk; the President

And Secretary to be chosen from among  
the Managers - the Treasurer & Clerk at disre-  
tion.

Art. IV. The Society shall hold annual  
Meetings on the first day of the Autumnal  
Session of the Lexington Presbytery, & to be

mon shall be delivered suitable to the  
occasions by some Member of its body,  
previously appointed; but should any e-  
mergency require an extraordinary meet-  
ing, the President shall have power to  
call one at the request of any three ma-  
nagers, & in this case, shall give notice  
to all the Managers at least fifteen days  
before such meeting takes place.

Art. V. The business of the Managers  
in their deliberation, shall be to devise the  
means of collecting the monies sub-  
mitted by the members of ~~this~~ Society -  
to form the most advantageous plans  
for increasing its funds - to institute  
enquiries for ascertaining to what part

of the Country Missionaries may be sent  
with the greatest prospect of success, & for  
finding out & employing proper persons  
for undertaking Missions, & compensating

shall be the duty of the Managers to pub-  
lish an annual report of their proceeding.  
Provided nevertheless, that the Managers of this  
Society shall have it in their power to ap-  
propriate its funds, or any part of them,  
to carry into effect any Missionary plan  
of the Synod of Virginia.

Art. VI. If any part of this Constitution  
shall be found not calculated to answer  
the designs of this Society, it shall be in  
the power of the Managers (the consent  
of a majority of them being obtained) to am-  
end any part of it as they may deem  
proper.

The Synod appointed Mr. Joseph Reed  
a Missionary for four Months, to resi-  
de in the Counties of Bath, Greenbrier  
Monroe, Botetourt, & Montgomery; and  
Mr. Samuel B. Wilson a Missionary for
