P R E F A C E .

THIS book is offered especially to Parents and Teachers, as an earnest effort to aid those who feel the importance of using every available means to impress Bible truth on the minds of the young; and to train the rising generation in the practice of Christian life. The wants felt in an experience of ten years as a teacher, led to the plan and execution of the work.

Allow me briefly to call your attention to three things in regard to the book:—ITS OBJECT; ITS PLAN; and the MODE OF USING IT.

I.—THE OBJECT (*a*) is to secure individual attention and united expression throughout the entire service; (*b*) to suggest important *doctrines* and duties in such a manner as to arrest the attention and awaken the interest of the young; (*c*) to familiarize the minds of the youth with the teachings of divine truth on all the great questions of life, and with the richest and sweetest treasures of sacred song; (*d*) to aid in preparing the sons and daughters of our homes, and of our institutions of learning more fervently and effectively to join in the devotions of home and of the great congregation. In one word, its object is to aid in *educating* (both by instruction and by development,) each child and student, as an accountable religious being, in the performance of his highest duty, and the employment of his greatest happiness.

II.—THE PLAN. (*a*) In preparing the book, the first step was to form an outline of the great Doctrines and Duties of religion, as these regard God and man; giving prominence to such as especially claim the attention of youth, and tend to shape the course of life. (*b*) Selections of Scripture were then made, enforcing and illustrating the given topic by precept, narrative, &c. These selections were afterwards arranged with a view to make them suggestive of the various bearings of the subject as far as practicable. (*c*) After that, appropriate Psalms and Hymns were chosen, keeping constantly in view the combination of strength and beauty, so that the choicest spiritual and poetical productions of our language, in youth might be treasured up for counsel and comfort in after life. (*d*) The adaptation of music to the hymns was considered a most important and difficult matter: several leading composers were consulted, and the final arrangement and adaptation of the music to the words was placed in the hands of T. J. Cook, of New York, whose name is a guarantee for the judicious execution of the work. (See Musical Preface, by Mr. Cook. (*e*) In view of the fact that many parents and teachers might hesitate, unaided, to lead their families and pupils in prayer, each page of the lesson was placed in the hands of some earnest Christian educator, and after its perusal, a prayer was written by him, adapted especially to that particular lesson. We have thus more than 250 leading minds, of all evangelical churches in our land, participating in the service of prayer, thus securing a variety, freshness and adaptation which could be obtained in no other way.

III.—MODE OF USE. (*a*) The book is bound in two editions—one of which contains only the lessons. This should be in the hands of each member of the family or school.

PARENTS. (*b*) The Parent may select, or allow some member of the family to select, the lesson for the day. He will then announce the subject, which is printed in Italics at the head of the page—lead in singing the Psalm or Hymn chosen—read in turn the selections of Scripture, and then lead in prayer.

TEACHERS. (*c*) The Teacher in school may select, or call on some pupil to select, the lesson for the day—when he will distinctly state the *subject* (printed in Italics at the head of the page) which is the key to the lesson. All join in singing the Hymn chosen. The

Teacher will then read the first verse, *one-half* the School read the second in *concert*, the other half read the third in like manner, and so around.

(d) The Teacher (all assuming the attitude of prayer) leads in prayer, using in whole or in part the form prepared, or directing the service in his own language. A Sabbath lesson might be assigned for the Lord's Day, and a portion of that memorized.

(e) While the book is not arranged by any formal division of days, months, or seasons, it furnishes material for five or ten months, accordingly as the lesson is used entire or divided for each service.

(Note.) *If Teachers prefer to shorten the service, one Hymn and one-half the Scripture selections may be used one day, and the other half the next—thus giving double the number of lessons for the year.*

It will be seen at a glance that the object of the book is to present Scripture truth, and lead to a life of purity and practical religion.

Those who examine the construction of the book will recognize a systematic form of religious truth. The repetition of important thoughts, Passages of Scripture, and Hymns, was often deemed very desirable. The idea of adaptation was kept constantly in view; and it may here be observed that full freedom was used, in selecting Psalms and Hymns, to omit such portions as were not suitable to the lesson on hand.

I am under great obligations to those friends of Christian education who have so kindly aided my undertaking by words of sympathy and cheerful contributions of copyright privileges, as well as by other service.

In selecting Psalms and Hymns I had access to a large number of collections published in this country and in England. Among these I cannot fail to mention, The Sabbath Hymn and Tune Book, Drs. Mason, Phelps and Park; The American Metrical Psalter, by Rt. Rev. G. Burgess, D. D., of Maine; Hymns, by Rev. Henry A. Boardman, D. D., The Plymouth Collection, by Henry Ward Beecher; and Songs of the Church, by Rev. Charles S. Robinson, of Brooklyn; and a small collection of Hymns, by Anna L. Waring, published by the Association of Friends. I am also under obligations to the publishers of the Sabbath Hymn and Tune Book, for their courtesy in giving consent to the use of the Hymns of that book, as well as of the music which they publish.

Many of the Hymns taken from books referred to above, being copy-righted, no one, I would observe, can use them without similar consent of authors or publishers.

To Dr. Lowell Mason I am under especial obligations, not only for counsel, but also for kindly permitting the use of a large number of his valuable church tunes in this work.

Sincere thanks are also due to Messrs. Perkins, Pelton, Kingsley, Root, Seward and Bradbury, and to F. J. Huntingdon, Publisher, for permission to use the tunes which they have severally furnished. All of Mr. Cook's tunes used in this work, except Radiance, Florence, and Herald, are now first published by his permission. He is the owner of them, and is to have the use of them in other publications.

The names of the authors of tunes will be found in an Index prepared especially to show by whom each tune has been furnished.

While I would refer to Mr. Cook's Musical Preface for remarks on the musical part of the work, I would earnestly commend to all interested in the improvement of the "service of song," a book called "Hymns and Choirs," chiefly prepared by the authors of the Sabbath Hymn and Tune Book. Pastors, choir leaders, singers, and all church members, will find it worthy of consideration.

The names of earnest Christian educators, who have aided in the completion of this Manual of Devotion, and to whom I am greatly indebted, will be found in full in an index. They are representatives of more than a dozen fruitful branches of the One Living Vine. Knowing this, we need not ask to what denomination each belongs. Are they not all one in Him.

With the earnest prayer that this work may aid Teachers, Parents and Youth, in the happy fulfilment of the great object of life, it is commended to Him who is the Author of every good purpose, and the Sustainer of every good work

My object has been to select from the many tunes that have become popular, those of good, solid character, such as musicians, as well as the people like, and which all our children should learn and remember through life. I have avoided the lively Sunday School music, so popular at the present day, principally on account of its ephemeral character.

A few new tunes are given, the greater portion of them being original. Of these latter the number was extended, because I experienced some difficulty in finding music well suited to certain hymns, and thought it best to write, or get others to write, new music for them. Regarding my own compositions, I trust they will be indulgently received, and be deemed, in some slight degree, worthy the good company in which they are found.



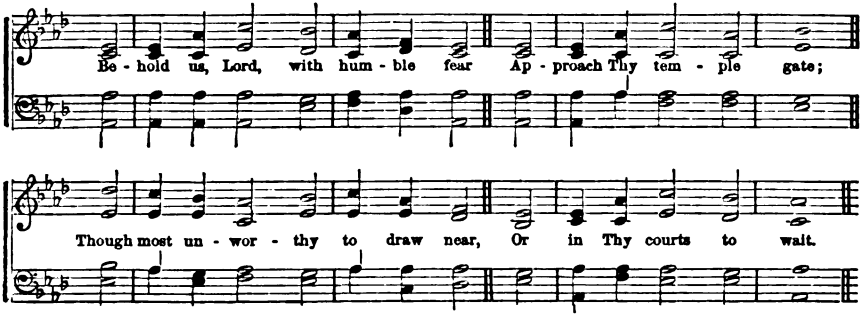

Prayer.—Lesson IV.

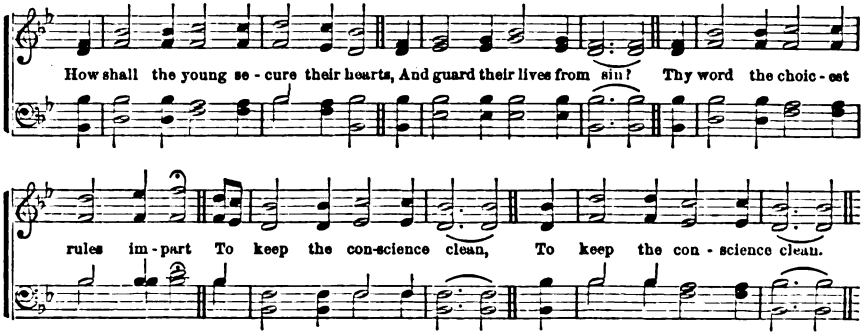

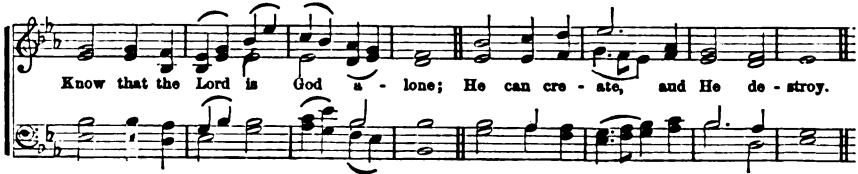
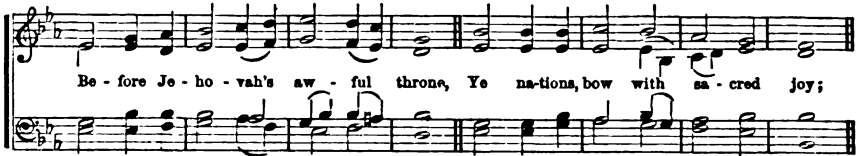

We would rejoice and trust in Jesus as an Almighty Saviour, who hath borne our iniquities, and who is ever able and willing to save.

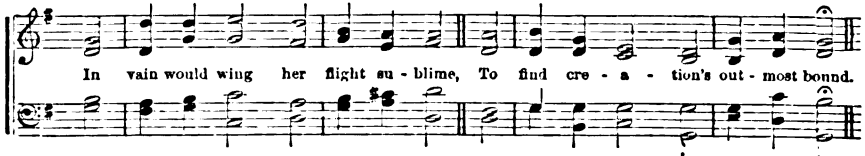
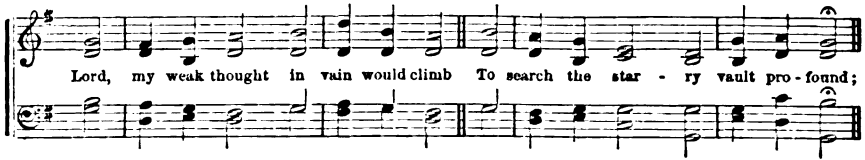

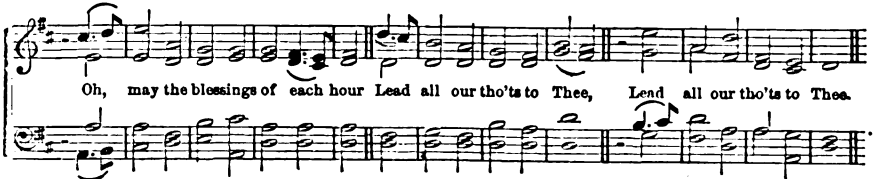

4 We are bound to give thanks alway to God for you, brethren, beloved of the Lord, because God hath from the beginning chosen you to salvation, through sanctification of the Spirit, and belief of the truth.

5 I have manifested thy name unto the men which thou gavest me out of the world. Thine they were, and thou gavest them me.

6 When the Gentiles heard this, they were glad, and glorified the word of the Lord, and as many as were ordained to eternal life, believed.

7 The Lord hath appeared of old unto me, saying, Yea, I have loved thee with an everlasting love: therefore with loving-kindness have I drawn thee.

8 He saw that there was no man, and wondered that there was no intercessor: therefore his arm brought salvation unto him.

9 Then said I, Lo, I come, (in the volume of the book it is written of me,) to do thy will, O God.

10 I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed: it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his heel.

11 Moreover, I will make a covenant of peace with them; it shall be an everlasting covenant with them; and I will place them, and multiply them, and I will set my sanctuary in the midst of them for evermore.

12 He was wounded for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him, and with his stripes we are healed.

13 There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit.

14 When he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you unto all truth, for he shall not speak of himself.

15 And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved, but he that believeth not, shall be damned.

16 Father, I will that they also whom thou hast given me, be with me where I am, that they may behold my glory which thou hast given me.

Prayer.—Lesson XIII.

ALMIGHTY God, our heavenly Father, we thank Thee that we are again permitted to assemble for Thy worship, and implore Thy blessing to rest upon us. We would realize our unfitness to come into Thy presence, and would seek Thy grace to enable us to worship Thee, “who art a Spirit, in spirit and in truth.”

We thank Thee for our temporal mercies—for life, health, and all those blessings which make life desirable. We thank Thee that Thou hast shed upon us the light of science and civilization, and given us the advantages of liberal culture and extensive usefulness in the world.

We implore Thy blessing, O God, especially upon the rising generation. Thou hast made special promises to them. May they “remember now their Creator in the days of their youth, while the evil days come not, nor the years draw nigh when they shall say, We have no pleasure in them.”

Regard in much mercy, we beseech Thee, our friends, wherever they are. May they be in Thy holy keeping, and share the rich blessings which we seek for ourselves.

May the light of the blessed gospel be speedily diffused through every land, and truth and righteousness every where prevail; for thine, O God, is the kingdom, the power, and the glory, now and forever. Amen.

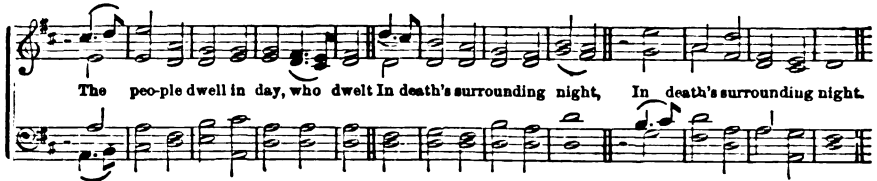
We thank Thee that this covenant is firm as the Rock of Ages; that though Heaven and earth may pass away, both its promises and its provisions shall endure forever.

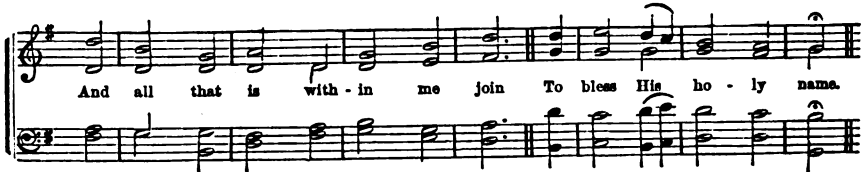

8 Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye should follow in his steps; who, when he was reviled, reviled not again: when he suffered, he threatened not, but committed himself to him that judgeth righteously.

9 Such a high priest became us, who is

holy, harmless, undefiled, and separate from sinners.

10 Christ hath also once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust.

11 And he saw that there was no man, and wondered that there was no intercessor; therefore his arm brought salvation unto him.

12 But so much the more there went a fame abroad of him: and great multitudes came together to hear, and to be healed by him of their infirmities.

13 And all bare him witness, and wondered at the gracious words which proceeded out of his mouth.

14 And the Pharisees and scribes murmured, saying, This man receiveth sinners and eateth with them.

15 Jesus saith unto them, My meat is to do the will of him that sent me, and to finish his work.

16 Jesus said, Suffer little children, and forbid them not, to come unto me. And he laid his hands on them.

17 And it came to pass, that while they communed together, and reasoned, Jesus himself drew near, and went with them.

18 And they said one to another, Did not our heart burn within us, while he talked with us by the way, and while he opened to us the Scriptures.

Prayer.—Lesson XXXII.

O THOU God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, we would humbly and reverently approach with these dear youth into Thy holy presence. Wilt Thou not smile upon us as we join to praise Thee for our continued health and strength, our food and raiment, our homes and comforts, our faculties and instructions, our opportunities and enjoyments, but especially for the gift of Thy Son, our Saviour, through whom we have all temporal and spiritual blessings. We rejoice in *His personal character* as unfolded in Thy inspired word. Once a child Himself, He knows how children feel. Once a youth, with a human understanding that gradually opened to receive knowledge, He knows how to sympathize with the young who are being trained for the duties and responsibilities of future life. Incline these dear youth to pattern after His perfect example. Like Him may they be obedient to parents, respectful to those in authority, and submissive to God. Oh, blessed Jesus, as Thou didst walk with the disciples who were journeying from Jerusalem to Emmaus, as Thou didst open their mind to understand the Scriptures, as Thou didst cause their hearts to burn within them, so wilt Thou not walk with these dear youth who are setting out in life's eventful journey? wilt Thou not help them in enriching their minds with important truths? wilt Thou not kindle in their bosoms the fires of gratitude, love and joy, that with burning hearts they may be impelled to, and strengthened for every good word and work? Oh, let all these dear youth realize during life the inspiration of Christ *in them, and with them, and for them.*

Help them this day in their studies, their recitations, the government of their tempers, and the control of their words and actions, so that at its close they may be able to exclaim, I have gained, rather than lost, another day. Mercifully regard their teachers, their parents, their kindred and all their friends.

Bless the great cause of Christian education. Prosper free institutions. Extend and establish Thine own kingdom in all the world, until Christ shall reign victorious, and the whole earth shall be filled with Thy glory. These, with all other mercies and blessings, we ask in the name and for the sake of our Divine Redeemer. Amen.

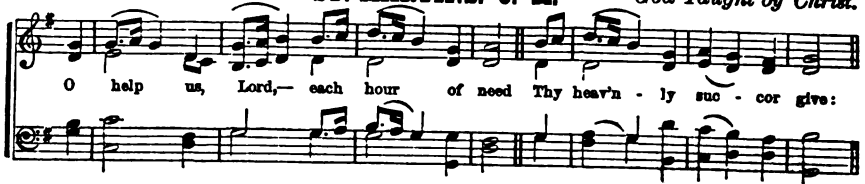

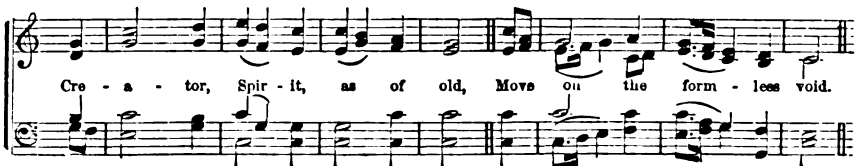
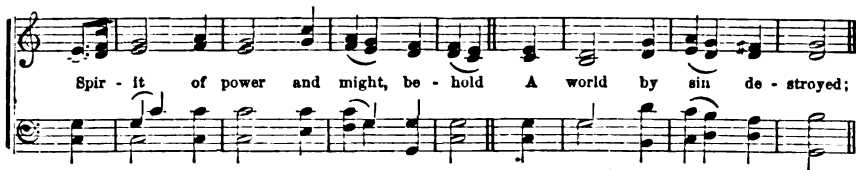

Prayer.—Lesson XXXVIII.

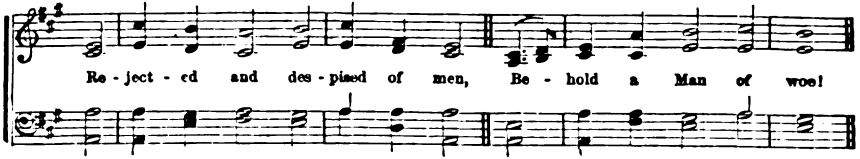

Thine own image, in which we were created, male and female, though marred and lost by our fall, Thou hast deigned, with infinite love and mercy, to restore.

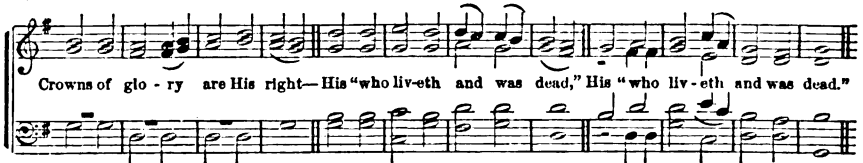

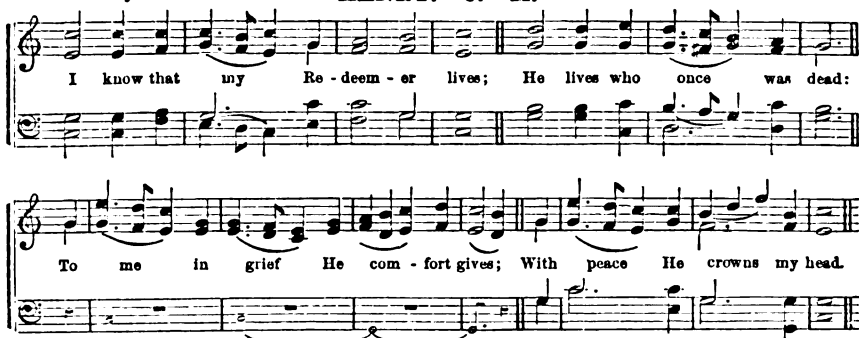

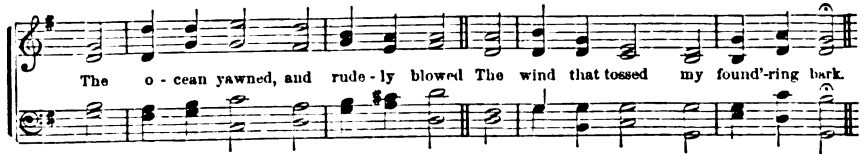
Hear us, we pray Thee, for our friends every where. Grant unto them the influence of Thy grace, and all necessary blessings.

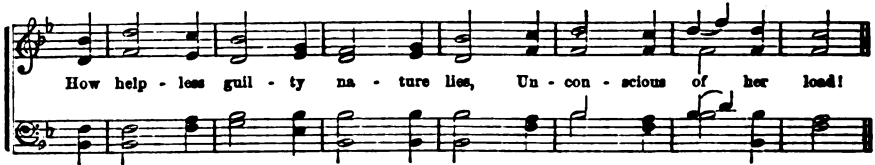
Be with us during this day, and every day, to control all our acts, our words, and thoughts. May we so live each day, that our very presence may savor of truth and heaven.

ALmighty and Eternal God, God over all, blessed forever, we desire to worship Thee. But Thou art the infinitely holy one, and archangels veil their faces when they stand in Thy presence. 14 But they have not all obeyed the gospel.

OH, THOU great Being who searchest all hearts, we this day *adore* Thee that all things are naked and open to Thine eyes. Thou beholdest all the evil and all the good. With Thee, actions are weighed, and Thou triest the spirits of men; Thou rewardest, and thou punishest, not merely according to our outward acts, but as we think and purpose in our hearts, so are we in Thy sight.

2 The son of an Israelitish woman, whose father was an Egyptian, went out among the children of Israel; and this son of the Israelitish woman, and a man of Israel strove together in the camp.

3 And the Israelitish woman's son blasphemed the name of the LORD, and cursed; and they brought him unto Moses;

4 And they put him in ward, that the mind of the LORD might be showed them.

5 And the LORD spake unto Moses, saying:

6 Bring forth him that hath cursed, without the camp; and let all that heard him lay their hands upon his head; and let all the congregation stone him.

7 And thou shalt speak unto the children of Israel, saying, Whosoever curseth his God, shall bear his sin.

8 And he that blasphemeth the name of the LORD, he shall surely be put to death, and all the congregation shall certainly stone him: as well the stranger, as he that is born in the land, when he blasphemeth the name of the LORD, shall be put to death.

9 And whosoever shall speak a word

against the Son of man, it shall be forgiven him; but unto him that blasphemeth against the Holy Ghost, it shall not be forgiven.

10 He that shall blaspheme against the Holy Ghost, hath never forgiveness, but is in danger of eternal damnation.

11 Because they said, He hath an unclean spirit.

12 Jesus said, That which cometh out of the man, that defileth the man.

13 For from within, out of the heart of man, proceed evil thoughts, blasphemy, pride, foolishness. All these evil things come from within and defile the man.

14 Upon a set day Herod, arrayed in royal apparel, sat upon his throne, and made an oration unto them.

15 And the people gave a shout, saying, It is the voice of a God, and not of a man.

16 And immediately the angel of the LORD smote him, because he gave not God the glory, and he was eaten of worms, and gave up the ghost.

17 Through breaking the law dishonorest thou God? for the name of God is blasphemed among the Gentiles through you.

18 But now, ye also, put off all these, anger, wrath, malice, blasphemy, filthy communication out of your mouth.

Prayer.—Lesson CVIII.

O THOU, whose name is exalted above all blessing and praise, we adore the grace which invites to commune with Thee, through our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. Thou art God, and beside Thee there is no other. Who is like unto Thee, O Lord? Glorious in holiness, fearful in praises, forgiving iniquity, and saving all those that put their trust in Thee. From Thee is nothing hid: but all things are naked and open in Thy sight, and there is not a word in our thoughts but Thou, Lord, knowest it altogether.

The foolish blaspheme Thy name, and gather to themselves Thy wrath. They reject Thy commandments to their hurt; and rush on ruin, in the blindness of their minds.

O preserve us from uttering Thy name thoughtlessly, and destroying our souls by that which goeth out of our lips. May we be temples, dedicated to Thy service, and all our words and deeds be governed by Thy fear.

O forgive us the sins which separate us from Thee, and bring pollution and disaster upon us. Help us to discover and turn from temptation, whether from the world, the flesh, or the devil; and to attain that holiness, without which no man can see Thee.

We render Thee thanks, O Lord! for all Thy great goodness toward us, suffering us to live, withholding from us the retributions we deserve, and multiplying upon us undeserved favors. We adore Thee for our national, domestic and personal blessings, and pray that they allure us not to earth, but to Thee.

Arrest, O Lord! the floods of iniquity which overspread our land, and let not our transgressions multiply till they demand our overthrow. Let not the profane rule over us. Let our country be a land of Bibles and Sabbaths, of schools and churches.

Write holiness on our national banner, and peace on the doors of our dwellings. Let our youth grow up in Thy fear, and the aged be honored among us. Let oppression, intemperance, fraud, and violence, cease from our midst.

Abolish war from the face of the earth, and cast every idol to the moles and the bats. Let Thy kingdom come, and Thy will be done upon earth as it is done in heaven; and to Thy name be glory and honor, praise and thanksgiving, world without end. Amen.

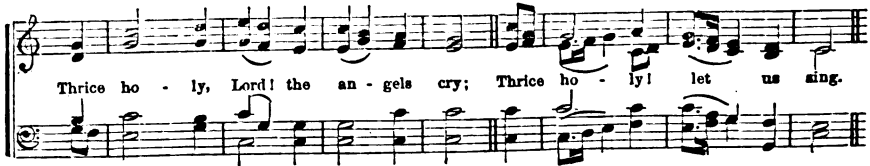

IF thou wilt not observe to do all the words of this law, that are written in this book, that thou mayest fear this glorious and fearful name, **THE LORD THY GOD,**

2 Then the **LORD** will make thy plagues wonderful, and the plagues of thy seed, even great plagues, and of long continuance, and sore sicknesses, and of long continuance, until thou be destroyed.

3 The **LORD** will not hold him guiltless that taketh his name in vain.

4 If one man sin against another, the judge shall judge him! but if a man sin against the **LORD**, who shall entreat for him?

5 I turned and lifted up mine eyes, and looked, and behold a flying roll.

6 And he said unto me, What seest thou? And I answered, I see a flying roll; the length thereof is twenty cubits, and the breadth thereof ten cubits.

7 Then said he unto me, This is the curse that goeth forth over the face of the whole earth; for every one that stealeth, shall be cut off, as on this side, according to it; and every one that sweareth, shall be cut off as on that side, according to it.

8 I will bring it forth, saith the **LORD** of hosts, and it shall enter into the house of the

thief, and into the house of him that sweareth falsely by my name: and it shall remain in the midst of his house and shall consume it.

9 Hear the word of the **LORD**, ye children of Israel: for the **LORD** hath a controversy with the inhabitants of the land: because there is no truth, nor mercy, nor knowledge of God in the land.

10 By swearing, and lying, and stealing, and committing adultery, they break out, and blood toucheth blood. Therefore shall the land mourn.

11 Shall I not visit for these things? saith the **LORD**: and shall not my soul be avenged on such a nation as this?

12 We are sure that the judgment of God is according to truth against them which commit such things.

13 And thinkest thou this, O man, that judgest them which do such things and doest the same, that thou shalt escape the judgment of God?

14 Who will render to every man, according to his deeds:

15 Tribulation and anguish upon every soul of man that doeth evil; of the Jew first, and also of the Gentile. For there is no respect of persons with God.

Prayer.—Lesson CXI.

ALmighty and most merciful God, our Heavenly Father, we cast ourselves at Thy feet, with deep humiliation and penitent grief, in view of the manifold transgressions by which we have dishonored Thy infinite majesty. Have mercy on us, we beseech Thee, and pour forth into our hearts Thy grace, that we may sincerely repent of all our sins against Thy most holy name.

We have sinned against Thee, O Lord, our God, not only in thought and in deed, but, also, most grievously, in word. For, Thy blessed Apostle James assures us: "If any man offend not in word, the same is a perfect man, and able to bridle the whole body."

O, Sovereign Majesty of Heaven, inspire us with an abhorrence of the scandalous vices by which Thy name is taken in vain, and possess our souls with that awful respect which is due to Thee alone. Give us grace to be watchful over our words, to avoid rash judgments and malicious reflections, and to employ our tongues on earth, as we hope to employ them in heaven.

Look down with an eye of pity and compassion, O Divine Jesus, on those unhappy swearers, cursers and blasphemers, who, opening their sacrilegious mouths, vent imprecations against the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; on those unfortunate ones who deliberately and voluntarily swear to what they know to be false; on all who, without an urgent necessity and reasonable cause, perpetrate a rash oath; and on such as swear to do unlawful acts. Dispel their darkness by Thy heavenly light, and restore them to the paths of truth and justice, that, cleansed by Thy precious blood, they may worthily magnify Thy great name.

Shed down the healthful influences of Thy grace, O Almighty and Eternal God, on all Christian rulers and states, and endue all in authority with wisdom and holy fear, that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life, in all godliness and honesty. Inspire the judges of our courts, the advocates who practise therein, the witnesses who testify, and the jurymen who sit in judgment, with proper awe for the sanctity of Thy name and word, to the end that, in the administration of oaths, the prevailing levity of spirit and disrespect for holy things may be made to pass away for ever, and Thy honor be duly regarded throughout the land. Fill the souls of all Thy creatures with a wholesome dread of the terrible day of judgment, in the which Thou wilt demand of them a strict account of every idle word and wicked deed, and teach them so to number their days that they may apply themselves unto wisdom. And when we shall be called upon to grapple with "the last enemy," Death, may Christ, who was crucified for us, defend us against the attacks of "our adversary, the devil," place us within the ever-verdant gardens of His paradise, and cause us to enjoy the sweetness of divine contemplation forever. Amen.

Six days shalt thou labor, and do all thy work: but the seventh is the sabbath of the Lord thy God: in it thou shalt not do any work, thou, nor thy son, nor thy daughter, thy man-servant nor thy maid-servant, nor thy cattle, nor thy stranger that is within thy gates: for in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that in them is, and rested the seventh day; wherefore the Lord blessed the sabbath day, and hallowed it.

2 Keep the sabbath day to sanctify it, as the Lord thy God hath commanded thee.

3 Six days shalt thou labor, and do all thy work.

4 And God blessed the seventh day and sanctified it; because that in it he had rested from all his work which God created and made.

5 Ye shall keep my sabbaths, and reverence my sanctuary: I am the Lord.

6 I am the Lord your God. Hallow my sabbaths; and they shall be a sign between me and you, that ye may know that I am the Lord your God.

7 And the Lord spake unto Moses, saying, Speak thou also unto the children of Israel, saying, Verily, my sabbaths ye shall keep; for it is a sign between me and you, through-

out your generations; that ye may know that I am the Lord, that doth sanctify you.

8 Ye shall keep the sabbath, therefore: for it is holy unto you. Every one that defileth it shall surely be put to death: for whosoever doeth any work therein, that soul shall be cut off from among his people.

9 Six days may work be done: but in the seventh is the sabbath of rest, holy to the Lord; whosoever doeth any work in the sabbath day, he shall surely be put to death.

10 Wherefore the children of Israel shall keep the sabbath, to observe the sabbath, throughout their generations, for a perpetual covenant.

11 It is a sign between me and the children of Israel for ever: for in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, and on the seventh day he rested, and was refreshed.

12 And Jesus said unto them, The sabbath was made for man, and not man for the sabbath.

13 This is the day which the Lord hath made: we will rejoice and be glad in it.

14 So the people rested on the seventh day.

15 The Lord hath said, To-morrow is the rest of the holy sabbath unto the Lord; bake that which ye will bake, to-day; and seethe that ye will seethe.

9 Then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord; and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob thy father; for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it.

10 Thus saith the Lord, Take heed to yourselves, and bear no burden on the sabbath day, nor bring it in by the gates of Jerusalem.

11 Neither carry forth a burden out of your houses, on the sabbath day; neither do ye any work, but hallow ye the sabbath day, as I commanded your fathers.

12 Jesus came to Nazareth where he had been brought up; and as his custom was, he went into the synagogue on the sabbath day, and stood up for to read.

15 Paul, as his manner was, went in unto them; and three sabbath days reasoned with them out of the Scriptures.

16 And he reasoned in the synagogue every sabbath.

Prayer.—Lesson CXIII.

O LORD, our Maker, Preserver, and Redeemer, we thank Thee for appointing one day in seven, to be a holy Sabbath day. We thank Thee that Thou hast given it to us as a day of rest from worldly labor and care; that its return reminds us of the finished glories of creation-work, and of the greater goodness and glory of God, displayed in our redemption by Jesus Christ, Thy Son, and our blessed Saviour.

We are prone to forget Thee, to forget our obligations to love and serve Thee, and to forget all Thy goodness to us; and we need the holy Sabbath, to remind us of these things. Above all, we are prone to neglect and forget the salvation of our souls, and to live as if we had no God to serve, no soul to save, no hell to shun, and no heaven to gain. 8 He did no sin, neither was guile found in his mouth.

9 Brethren, if any of you do err from the

truth, and one convert him, let him know that he which converteth a sinner from the error of his way, shall save a soul from death, and shall hide a multitude of sins.

10 There is a way that seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death.

11 Let us walk honestly, as in the day, not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying.

12 Know ye not that the unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of God? Be not deceived; neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor effeminate, nor abusers of themselves with mankind;

13 Nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners, shall inherit the kingdom of God.

4 When thou sawest a thief, then thou consentedst with him, and hast been partaker with adulterers.

5 Israel hath sinned, and they have also transgressed my covenant which I commanded; for they have even taken of the accursed thing, and have also stolen, and dissembled also, and they have put it even among their own stuff.

6 Jesus answering said, A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves, which stripped him of his raiment, and wounded him, and departed leaving him half dead.

7 This know, that if the good man of the house, had known what hour the thief would come, he would have watched, and not have suffered his house to be broken through.

8 Ye do wrong, and defraud, and that your brethren.

9 Jacob was wroth, and chode with Laban; and Jacob answered and said to Laban, What

is my trespass? what is my sin, that thou hast so hotly pursued after me?

10 Whereas thou hast searched all my stuff, what hast thou found of all thy household stuff? Set it here before my brethren, and thy brethren, that they may judge betwixt us both.

11 If a thief be found breaking up, and be smitten that he die, there shall no blood be shed for him.

12 If the sun be risen upon him, there shall be blood shed for him; for he should make full restitution.

13 He that stealeth a man, and selleth him, or if he be found in his hand, he shall surely be put to death.

14 Give me neither poverty nor riches; feed me with food convenient for me, lest I be poor and steal, and take the name of my God in vain.

15 Thou that preachest, a man should not steal, dost thou steal?

16 Let no man go beyond, and defraud his brother in any matter; because that the Lord is the avenger of all such.

17 The robbery of the wicked shall destroy them, because they refuse to do judgment.

18 Whoso is partner with a thief hateth his own soul.

Prayer.—Lesson CXXXII.

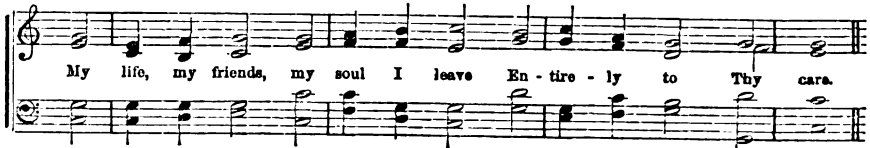

7 The proud have forged a lie against me, but I will keep thy precepts with my whole heart.

8 This is a rebellious people, lying children, children that will not hear the law of the LORD.

9 They bend their tongues like their bows for lies; but they are not valiant for the truth upon the earth; for they proceed from evil to evil, and they know not me, saith the LORD.

10 Thy habitation is in the midst of deceit: through deceit they refuse to know me, saith the LORD.

11 Burning lips, and a wicked heart, are like a potsherd covered with silver doors.

12 They will deceive every one his neighbor, and will not speak the truth: they have taught their tongue to speak lies, and weary themselves to commit iniquity.

13 The words of his mouth were smoother than butter; but war was in his heart; his words were softer than oil, yet were they drawn swords.

14 They delight in lies, they bless with their mouth, but they curse inwardly.

15 In many things we offend all. If any man offend not in word, the same is a perfect man, and able also to bridle the whole body.

16 The remnant of Israel shall not do iniquity, nor speak lies; neither shall a deceitful tongue be found in their mouth: for they shall feed and lie down, and none shall make them afraid.

17 A hypocrite with his mouth destroyeth his neighbor.

18 He said, Surely they are my people, children that will not lie; so he was their Savior.

19 Who is a liar, but he that denieth that Jesus is the Christ? He is anti-Christ that denieth the Father and the Son.

20 LORD, who shall abide in thy tabernacle? who shall dwell in thy holy hill?

21 He that speaketh the truth in his heart.

Prayer.—Lesson CXXXVII.

ALMIGHTY God, our Heavenly Father, we bless Thee for the privilege of once more compassing the mercy-seat, and worshipping toward Thy holy hill. We adore Thee for what Thou art in Thyself, a being infinite in all Thy attributes and perfections, and for the manifestations which Thou hast made of Thyself to the children of men.

May we, in temper, word and act, be like Him who was holy, harmless, undefiled and separate from sinners.

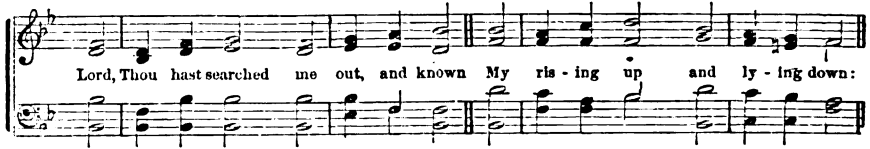

4 Be it known unto you, therefore, men and brethren, that through this man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sin;

5 And by him all that believe are justified from all things from which ye could not be justified by the law of Moses.

6 Knowing that a man is not justified by the works of the law, but by the faith of Jesus Christ, even we have believed in Jesus Christ, that we might be justified by the faith of Christ, and not by the works of the law: for by the works of the law shall no flesh be justified.

7 Whosoever committeth sin, transgresseth also the law; for sin is the transgression of the law.

8 If our heart condemn us, God is greater than our heart, and knoweth all things.

9 Thou that makest thy boast of the law, through breaking the law, dishonorest thou God?

10 He is not a Jew, which is one outwardly; neither is that circumcision, which is outward in the flesh:

11 But he is a Jew which is one inwardly; and circumcision is that of the heart, in the spirit and not in the letter: whose praise is not of men, but of God.

12 Therefore the law is holy, and the commandment holy, and just, and good.

13 For we know that the law is spiritual; but I am carnal, sold under sin.

14 Israel, which followed after the law of righteousness, hath not attained to the law of righteousness. Wherefore? Because they sought it not by faith, but as it were, by the works of the law.

15 For they, being ignorant of God's righteousness, and going about to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted themselves to the righteousness of God.

16 For Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to every one that believeth.

17 All the law is fulfilled in one word, even in this: Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself.

18 Whosoever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all. For he that said, Do not commit adultery, said also, Do not kill. Now, if thou commit no adultery, yet if thou kill, thou art become a transgressor of the law.

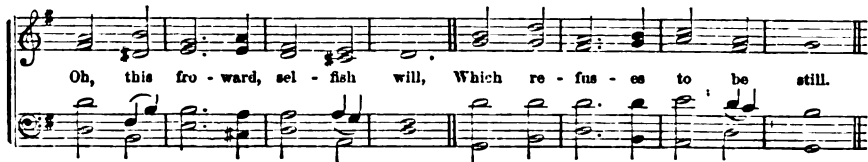





Prayer.—Lesson CXLVIII.

O LORD! Thou art great, mighty and terrible; glorious in holiness, fearful in praises, doing wonders. Even Thou art God alone; Thou hast made the heaven, the heaven of heavens, with all their host; the earth, and all things that are therein; and for Thy glory hast Thou made them.

Thou art not a God that hath pleasure in wickedness: neither shall evil dwell with Thee. Thou lovest righteousness and hatest wickedness. Of purer eyes art Thou than to behold evil, and Thou canst not look on iniquity with the least degree of allowance. Thou art worthy, O Lord, to receive blessing, and honor, and glory, and power: for Thou art just and true in all Thy ways, and righteous in all Thy judgments.

O, our God! we are ashamed to raise our eyes in Thy presence, because we have sinned against Thee. Behold, we are vile, and what shall we answer Thee? We have transgressed Thy law, like Adam, and what shall we plead? We will lay our hand upon our mouth, and put our mouth in the dust, crying, Unclean, unclean in Thy sight. We acknowledge that Thou art clear when thou judgest, and doth refuse to bless the guilty; for Thou madest man upright, but we have sought out many inventions; Thou didst create us in honor, but we abode not; Thou formed us in Thine own image, but we defaced it; Thou madest us a little lower than the angels, but we became like beasts that perish.

O God, our Judge! we would not justify ourselves; for should we do so in our hearts, our own mouths would condemn us. When we remember that Thou art to be feared, that Thou art a consuming fire, and that none can stand in Thy sight when once Thou art angry; when we consider the hardness of our hearts, the darkness of our minds, the perverseness of our wills, and the deadness of our affections, we feel that our way hath been our folly, that it hath justly separated us from Thee, and that the end thereof should be death. We confess that we are guilty before Thee, O God, and that Thou mightest justly swear in Thy wrath, that we should never enter into Thy rest. Shouldst Thou set us naked and bare, and take from us the corn in its season, and put in our hands the cup of trembling, yet wouldst Thou be just; for Thou hast done right, but we have done wickedly. O Lord, whatever Thou mayest send upon us we will accept, humbling ourselves under Thy mighty hand, and saying, The Lord is righteous.

Almighty God, while we complain not that we are obnoxious to Thy wrath, yet would we hope in Thy mercy; for Thou hast said, and hast confirmed it with an oath, that Thou hast no pleasure in the death of sinners, but rather that they would turn and live. We bless Thy name that Thou hast given Thy Son to die for us, that Thou hast laid help on One who is mighty to save: so that through His work Thou canst be just, and yet justify the ungodly. O Lord, show us Thy mercy, and grant us Thy salvation.

JESUS answered, and said unto them, My mother and my brethren are these which hear the word of God and do it.

2 Walk worthy of the Lord unto all pleasing, being fruitful in every good work, and increasing in the knowledge of God.

3 And it shall be our righteousness if we observe to do all these commandments before the LORD our God, as he hath commanded us.

4 Thou, O man of God, flee these things, and follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness.

5 Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life, whereunto thou art also called, and hast professed a good profession before many witnesses.

6 Charge them that are rich in this world, that they be not high-minded, nor trust in uncertain riches, but in the living God, who giveth us richly all things to enjoy:

7 That they do good, that they be rich in good works, be ready to distribute, willing to communicate.

8 Put them in mind to be subject to principalities and powers, to obey magistrates, to be ready to every good work.

9 This is a faithful saying, and these things I will that thou affirm constantly, that they which have believed in God might be careful to maintain good works. These things are good and profitable unto men.

10 I beseech you, therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service.

11 According as he hath chosen us in him, before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love.

12 I press toward the mark, for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.

13 Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things.

14 That ye would walk worthy of God, who hath called you unto his kingdom and glory.

15 Furthermore, then, we beseech you, brethren, and exhort you by the Lord Jesus, that as ye have received of us how ye ought to walk and to please God, so ye would abound more and more.

16 Abide in me and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine, no more can ye, except ye abide in me. Without me ye can do nothing.

17 Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; so shall ye be my disciples.

Prayer.—Lesson CLI.

OUR FATHER, who art in heaven! we render thanks to Thee that, through Thy boundless grace, Thou hast made us capable of accomplishing great good. We thank Thee for any disposition Thou hast given us to bless and benefit our fellow-creatures. So, also, we thank Thee for the means of various kinds which Thou hast placed in our hands for doing good to such as need our help. We thank Thee that the constant teaching of our holy religion is that we do good of every possible sort, and as far as possible, to all men. 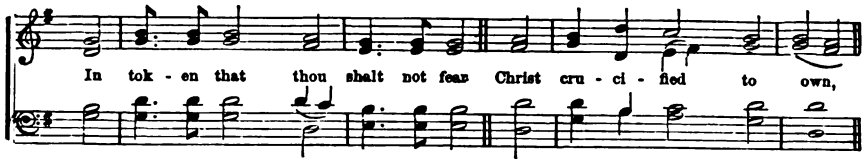

11 Then cometh Jesus from Galilee to Jordan, unto John, to be baptized of him.

12 But John forbade him, saying, I have need to be baptized of thee, and comest thou to me?

13 And Jesus answering, said unto him, Suffer it to be so now; for thus it becometh us to fulfil all righteousness. Then he suffered him.

14 Many of the Corinthians hearing, believed, and were baptized.

15 Moreover, brethren, I would not that ye should be ignorant, how that all our fathers were under the cloud, and all passed through the sea;

16 And were all baptized unto Moses in the cloud, and in the sea.

17 By one Spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we be Jews or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free; and have been all made to drink into one Spirit.

Prayer.—Lesson CLX.

AS WE assemble this morning, we invoke Thy blessing, O Lord, upon the labors and the pleasures of this day. Follow the blessings of the night with those of the day. THE cup of blessing which we bless, is it not the communion of the blood of Christ? The bread which we break, is it not the communion of the body of Christ?

2 For we being many are one bread, and one body; for we are all partakers of that one bread.

3 Ye cannot drink the cup of the Lord, and the cup of devils; ye cannot be partakers of the Lord's table, and of the table of devils.

4 For I have received of the Lord that which also I delivered unto you, That the Lord Jesus, the same night in which he was betrayed, took bread;

5 And when he had given thanks, he brake it, and said, Take, eat; this is my body, which is broken for you: this do in remembrance of me.

6 After the same manner, also, he took the cup, when he had supped, saying, This cup is the new testament in my blood: this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me.

7 For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye do show the Lord's death till he come.

8 Wherefore, whosoever shall eat this bread, and drink this cup of the Lord, unworthily, shall be guilty of the body and blood of the Lord.

9 But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread, and drink of that cup.

10 For he that eateth and drinketh unworthily, eateth and drinketh damnation to himself, not discerning the Lord's body.

11 For this cause many are weak and sickly among you, and many sleep.

12 For if we would judge ourselves, we would not be judged.

13 When ye come together, therefore, into one place, this is not to eat the Lord's supper.

14 For in eating every one taketh, before other, his own supper; and one is hungry and another is drunken.

15 What! have ye not houses to eat and to drink in? or despise ye the Church of God, and shame them that have not? What shall I say to you? shall I praise you in this? I praise you not.

16 Wherefore, my brethren, when ye come together to eat, tarry one for another.

17 And, if any man hunger, let him eat at home: that ye come not together unto condemnation.

18 They told what things were done in the way, and how he was known of them in the breaking of bread.

19 They continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine, and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers.

Prayer.—Lesson CLXI.

O THOU eternal and ever-blessed God, we will praise Thee, for Thou art good, and ready to forgive, and plenteous in mercy unto all them that call upon Thy name. How precious are Thy thoughts unto us; and how great is the sum of them! Thou hast not dealt with us according to our sins, nor rewarded us according to our iniquities, but with infinite compassion and tender mercy daily loadest us with benefits. Thou givest us richly all things to enjoy, and fillest our hearts with food and gladness.

We blush with shame when we think how we have requited Thee. We have not served Thee as we ought, nor obeyed Thy holy commandments; we have followed evil instead of that which is good, and have thus grievously offended Thee; we have rewarded Thee with ingratitude instead of love.

Grant us, Lord, we beseech Thee, sincere contrition for these and all our sins. A broken and contrite heart Thou wilt not despise. We confess that we are sinners—that against Thee, Thee only have we sinned, and done evil in Thy sight. But we lament that we do not know ourselves as we should.



14 For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich.

15 In all things approving ourselves, as the ministers of God, in much patience, in stripes, in imprisonments, in tumults, in labors, in watchings, in fastings.

16 If I must needs glory, I will glory of the things which concern mine infirmities.

17 Therefore, I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distresses, for Christ's sake: for when I am weak, then am I strong.

18 For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, teaching us, that denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present world.

Prayer.—Lesson CLXX.

OUR FATHER, who art in Heaven! Send Thy good Spirit, we pray Thee, that, taking these things of Christ, He may show them unto us. In our sin we are blind and ignorant. We know nothing aright. Interpret Thou these great truths to our minds and hearts, and help us to translate them, we beseech Thee, into our lives.

Teach us what self-denial for Christ's sake is; and teach us the blessedness of it. Help us to see and feel that that life into which Christ does not enter, which He does not inspire, and guide, and nurture, which is not full of glad service rendered Him, looking only to Him for its reward, is empty and miserable.

Let every one in this Thy presence be brought now to repentance for sin, to the renunciation of self, and to the acceptance of Christ, instead. And let this not seem to any one of us a grievous, irksome duty, but enable us to look upon it rather as a privilege. Awaken us, then, to our true interests. Beget in us a spirit of willing obedience. Let the great love of Christ for us, kindle in us a love for Him and His cause. Let us recognize His claims upon us and our services, and with heartiness let us consecrate ourselves to Him. We confess our weakness—of ourselves we can do nothing; but with Thee to assist us we can do all things,—even to the giving up of ourselves wholly unto Thee, and taking up the cross daily and following Thee.

Glorify Thyself in us thus, we pray Thee, using us to advance the interests of Thy kingdom here below. Day by day may we grow in grace, and in the knowledge of Thee, bearing in our lives constantly the fruits of godliness, and growing up into the stature of perfect men in Christ Jesus. And admit us, at last, when our work on earth is done, to the inheritance of the just, where eternally we may praise Him whom through good and evil report, in all humility, we have followed here in this life. And to our glorified and ascended Lord shall be the praise, now and forever. Amen.


Oh, who is sufficient for these things? Be Thou our Helper, our Wisdom, our Success, and Thine shall be the praise.

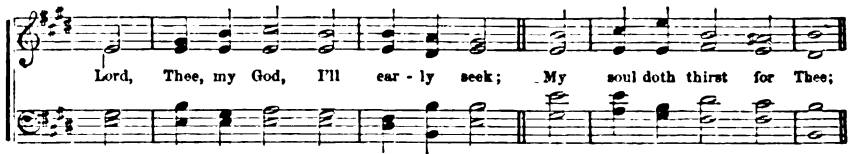
We ask Thee to prosper us this day in every good work, and at no time withhold Thy loving-kindness from our souls. O Lord God of Abraham, do Thou help us continually.

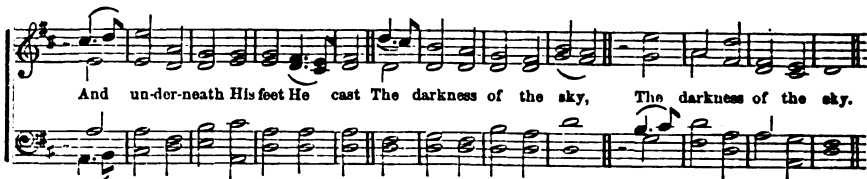
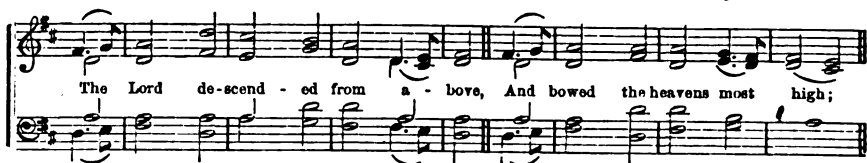

3 In the business of the ambassadors of the princes of Babylon, who sent unto Hezekiah to inquire of the wonder that was done in the land, God left him, to try him, that he might know all that was in his heart.

4 Wherefore, let him that thinketh he standeth, take heed lest he fall.

5 There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man; but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able, but will, with the temptation, also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it.

6 For this thing I besought the LORD thrice, that it might depart from me. And he said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee.

7 Blessed is the man that endureth temptation; for when he is tried he shall receive the crown of life, which the LORD hath promised to them that love him.

8 Let no man say, when he is tempted, I am tempted of God; for God cannot be tempted with evil, neither tempteth he any man;

9 But every man is tempted when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed.

10 Then when lust hath conceived, it bringeth forth sin; and sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death.

11 Wait on the LORD; be of good courage, and he shall strengthen thine heart: wait, I say, on the LORD.

12 The steps of a good man are ordered by the LORD, and he delighteth in his way;

13 Though he fall, he shall not be utterly cast down; for the LORD upholdeth him with his hand.

14 Thou shalt guide me with thy counsel, and afterward receive me to glory.

15 And now, I am no more in the world, but these are in the world, and I come to thee, Holy Father: keep through thine own name those whom thou hast given me.

16 While I was with them in the world, I kept them in thy name: those that thou gavest me I have kept.

17 I pray not that thou shouldst take them out of the world, but that thou shouldst keep them from the evil.

18 Neither pray I for them alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word.

19 Father, I will that they also whom thou hast given me, be with me where I am, that they may behold my glory, which thou hast given me; for thou lovedst me before the foundation of the world.

Prayer.—Lesson CLXXXIX.

O THOU, who art the refuge and dwelling-place of thy people in all generations, our waiting eyes are unto Thee, imploring Thy protection and guidance. Listen to the voice of our supplications, while, conscious of the difficulties and dangers that surround us, we pray ourselves out of our own keeping into Thine.

We inhabit a world lying in wickedness and abounding in temptations. Holy Father, keep us from the evil that is in the world, and deliver us from the love, power and dominion of every sin.

We have within us evil hearts of unbelief, continually leading us astray from the living God. Save us, we beseech Thee, from ourselves, and from the corrupt propensities of our depraved nature, that we may not be drawn away by our own lusts and enticed.

We have a subtle adversary, who, as a roaring lion, walketh about seeking whom he may devour. TRAIN up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it. Foolishness is bound in the heart of a child; but the rod of correction shall drive it far from him.

2 I will perform against Eli all things which I have spoken concerning his house, for the iniquity which he knoweth; because his sons made themselves vile, and he restrained them not.

3 Withhold not correction from the child; for if thou beatest him with the rod he shall not die.

4 Thou shalt beat him with the rod, and shalt deliver his soul from hell.

5 The rod and reproof give wisdom; but a child left to himself bringeth his mother to shame.

6 Correct thy son, and he shall give thee rest; yea, he shall give delight unto thy soul.

7 Chasten thy son while there is hope, and let not thy soul spare for his crying.

8 He that spareth his rod, hateth his son: but he that loveth him, chasteneth him betimes.

9 Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers, for there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained of God.

10 Whosoever therefore resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God; and they

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that resist shall receive to themselves damnation.

11 For rulers are not a terror to good works, but to the evil. Wilt thou then not be afraid of the power? Do that which is good, and thou shalt have praise of the same:

12 For he is the minister of God to thee for good. But if thou do that which is evil, be afraid; for he beareth not the sword in vain; for he is the minister of God, a revenger, to execute wrath upon him that doeth evil.

13 Wherefore, ye must needs be subject, not only for wrath, but also for conscience sake.

14 Submit yourselves to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake; whether it be to the king, as supreme;

15 Or unto governors, as unto them that are sent by him for the punishment of evil doers, and for the praise of them that do well.

16 We have had fathers of our flesh, which corrected us, and we gave them reverence; shall we not much rather be in subjection to the Father of spirits and live?

17 He that curseth his father, or his mother, shall surely be put to death.

18 Put them in mind to be subject to principalities and powers, to obey magistrates, to be ready to every good work.

Prayer.—Lesson CCIV.

O LORD, the High and Mighty One, who inhabitest eternity, Lord of lords and King of kings, in whose hands are the destinies of individuals and nations, look down from heaven, Thy dwelling-place, upon us, Thine unworthy children, as we are assembled here this morning, teachers and pupils, to invoke Thy Divine blessing to rest upon us, Thy Holy Spirit to enlighten us, Thy supreme wisdom to guide us, and Thy mighty power to protect us during the day.

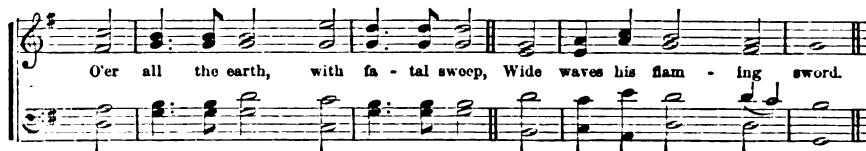
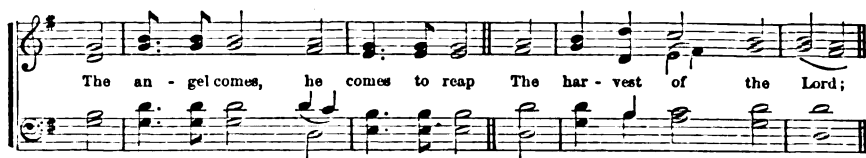

5 But I have prayed for thee, that thy faith fail not; and when thou art converted, strengthen thy brethren.

6 Now the serpent was more subtle than any beast of the field which the Lord God had made, and he said unto the woman, Yea, hath God said, Ye shall not eat of every tree of the garden?

7 And the woman said unto the serpent, We may eat of the fruit of the trees of the garden;

8 But of the fruit of the tree which is in the midst of the garden, God hath said, Ye shall not eat of it, neither shall ye touch it, lest ye die

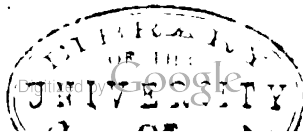

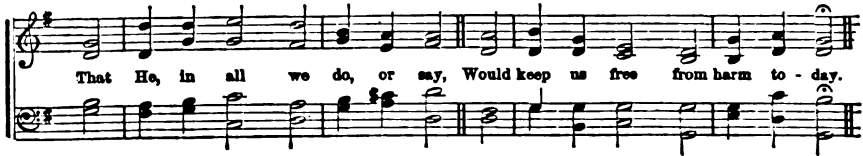

14 Preach the word; be instant in season, and out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all long-suffering and doctrine.

15 Watch thou in all things, endure afflictions, do the work of an evangelist, make full proof of thy ministry.

16 But avoid foolish questions, and genealogies, and contentions, and strivings about the law; for they are unprofitable and vain.

17 This is a true saying: If a man desire the office of a bishop, he desireth a good work.

18 Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth.

ALMIGHTY GOD and Heavenly Father, who, through Thy Son Jesus Christ, hast set in the Church which He hath purchased with His own blood, Apostles, Prophets, Evangelists, Pastors, and Teachers, for the perfecting of the Saints—for the work of the ministry—for the edifying of the Church of Christ, which is His body, mercifully behold Thy servants who are called by the Holy Ghost to the office and work of the Ministry.

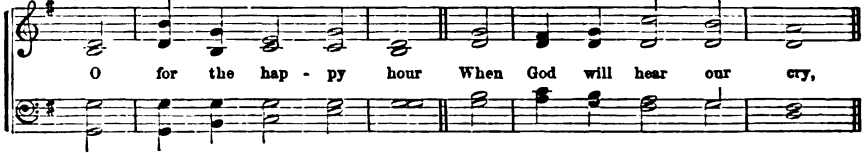

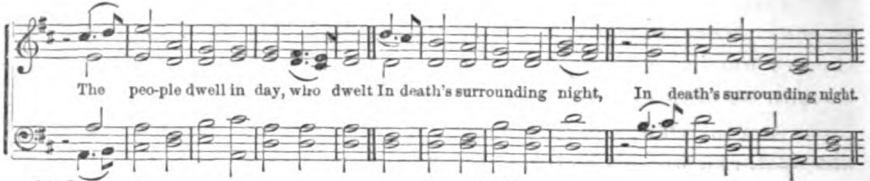

WE THANK Thee, heavenly Father, for the years which Thou art giving us upon the earth, and for all the mercies and blessings which crown these years.

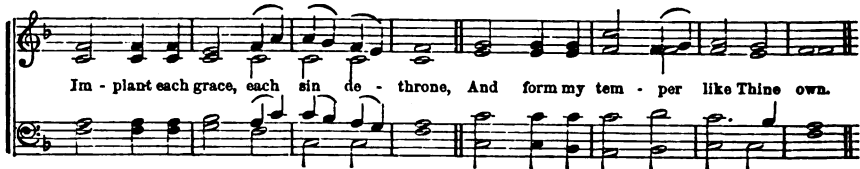

11 But when that which is perfect is come, then that which is in part shall be done away.

12 When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child; but when I became a man, I put away childish things.

13 For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face; now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known.

14 And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity.

15 This is my commandment, That ye love one another as I have loved you.

16 Let all your things be done with charity.

17 By love serve one another, for all the law is fulfilled in one word, even in this: Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself.

18 Above all these things, put on charity, which is the bond of perfectness.

19 Now the end of the commandment is charity out of a pure heart, and of a good conscience, and of faith unfeigned.

20 Above all things, have fervent charity among yourselves: for charity shall cover the multitude of sins.

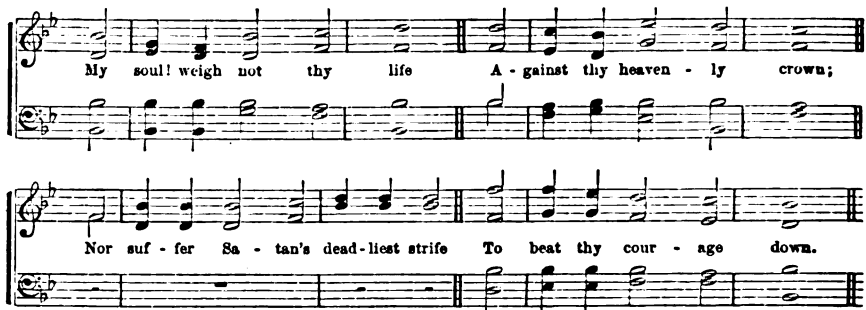

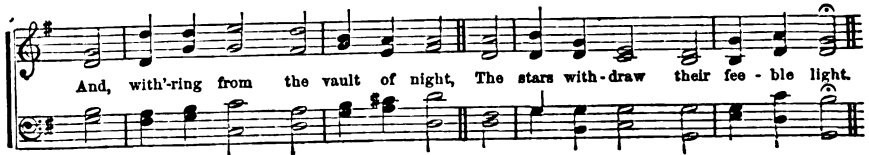
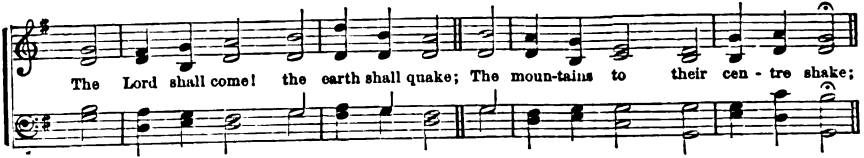
